OR, you might respond in obedience and head to Mongolia.

What IF ...

If you chose obedience. What would you do to be effective in ministry? I'm guessing you'd move to Mongolia. It is, after all, easier to reach the masses of Mongolian people by going to them instead of expecting them to come to you. It's also easier to

connect in person instead of trying to arrange meetings via Skype[®].

So, You Could ...

I suppose you'd learn the language. I doubt you'd require the locals to learn English so that they could learn and understand the Gospel message. You'd learn the cultural nuances. How to build bridges, how to build relationships, how

offending someone by committing an accidental faux pas. Maybe you'd live in a Yurt and learn to drink Yak

learn to drink **Yak milk**. I don't know

what your life would look like, but I'm guessing you'd be making some wholesale changes to reach the Mongolian people and to respond in obedience.

Now, what if God called you to reach the people of Dallas, OR (or Fall City, Independence, or Salem)?

Would you look for ways to engage? Would you become a student of the culture? Would you be willing to sacrifice and make changes in order to develop opportunities to reach your friends and neighbors?

OR, would you ignore the call, or convince yourself that you only imagined that God wanted you to be a witness for Him in the place He providentially placed you. Would metaphorically run away like Jonah?

If you did try to reach the people of your community, would you expect them to take the initiative to come to you, would you expect them to learn your 'language?' Would you just put up a sign and wait for people to respond? **OR**, would you be intentional. Would you take action?

We ARE Missionaries!

We need to start seeing ourselves as missionaries. We need to have the same commitment to reaching our community that we would have responding to a miraculous call to a foreign land. We need to pray for God's love to fill our heart with His concern for the people that He has put us in proximity with. We need to realize that we have a

mission. Because the commission God has given is for all believers wherever we are we should be making disciples.

Willing to Adapt

And while we should never change the substance of the message of Christ, we need to be willing to move and adapt in order to find opportunities to share the Gospel. We need to be missionaries who seek to understand our audience

so we can more effectively communicate Christ.

Commitment to our

mission may mean sacrificing time, or style of service, or money, or any other number of things.

God Placed Us Here and Now

I don't know what God will do through us. I don't know what He has in store. What I do know is that God has placed us in this time and place. He has called us to be His witnesses and empowered us with His own Holy Spirit. We need to be willing to take the opportunity given and to use it for His glory. This requires more than passivity. It requires action.

Let us be people of action, seeking to live out the Great Commission in our own mission field—in the place where God has placed us. †

*I just used Mongolia as an illustration of a foreign field. I could have just as easily have chosen Denmark, or Uganda, or Bolivia. I chose Mongolia because I wanted to use the word Yurt in my article.

Silent Killer

High blood pressure is known as the "silent killer" so years ago the health



care team began sponsoring a blood pressure check the first Sunday of the month in the kitchen alcove.

Every month people would come in to have their blood pressure checked. The numbers have decreased due to probably two factors: Covid–19 and participants bought their own device to monitor their blood pressure at home. (Oh, I forgot, drinking caffeinated coffee before getting it checked was a common reason too!)

Do YOU Want This?

Because very few people are taking advantage of this service, the health care team is considering

discontinuing this service in 2023.

Health Topic Survey

In the fall of 2021, we passed out a survey listing a variety of health topics. We asked the church family for input to help us plan presentations, seminars, etc. that would meet their needs.

presentation.

The Attributes of God

Do You Know the Right God?

ou've probably never heard of **Phil Erdman**. He was the youngest 47th Nebraska legislative district representative, elected just 4 years after graduating from high school.

You don't know him, but I went to high school with him. His family attended the church in which I grew up. So, if his name were somehow to come up in conversation, I'd be able to tell you not only how he voted during his 8 years in office, but about the conservative, agricultural values that led to those votes.

You now know a little about Phil Erdman.—I know Phil Erdman. You could try to converse about him or his voting record, I suppose. But the moment you said, "The guy I voted for would never support better tax rates for farmers," we'd both know that you have a false image of the poor guy. We might laugh a little and move on to a topic better suited to both of us.

Do We REALLY Know Him?

But here's the thing. Sometimes we talk about God like we know Him... when in reality, we don't.

It's not uncommon for people even for Christians—to have an



inaccurate understanding of God. I hear people say things like, "Well, my God would never send people who do good things to hell," or "Im a Christian, but I could never worship a God who would wipe out entire people groups, like what I read in the Old Testament."

The hard truth is, though, that God is who He is and does what He does, no matter our opinion or preferences. We tend to like the "warm, fuzzy" parts of God—attributes like loving and merciful that seem more to our benefit—but we struggle to accept the more challenging attributes, like wrathful. We may even overlook them, and in doing so, develop an incorrect image of the God we claim to love and serve.

I would go so far as to argue that we create an idol—something that resembles God *but isn't God*—when we try to make God be what we want Him to be. We could begin to worship our idea of God instead of God Himself.

Must Learn the WHO

When we try to manipulate what is true about God, or limit what we are willing to believe about God, that

informs the way we live out our Christian life. We must learn *who* He truly is so that, in our journey to look like Him, we can truly reflect Him. And learning to truly know God is a life–long process.

Study His Attributes!

One way to really get to know God is by studying His attributes. As you read through His Word, look for clues that reveal His qualities:

- **Moliness**
- **⋈** Goodness
- **Wrath**

Then, find out what each attribute means. Make sure to work from a correct definition, not just your idea of the word. Next, ask, "What does [attribute] look like in the context of God?"

In other words, how does this facet of God look in His interactions with His people? What does that tell me about Him? Now, ask, "How do I interact with [attribute]?" In light of what you have learned about this aspect of God, how should your thinking or actions change?

Talk It Through

Talk to God as you work through this entire process. Ask Him to reveal Himself to you, to show you the truth of who He is. As you build up layer after layer of knowledge of God, you will see an ever—clearer picture of Him. And that will shape you to look more like Him.

and could not be turned on again until that magic ID number was added to the system. This left us constantly explaining to people that we could not call them since our phones did not work, *so could*

we try some other communication method?

When we looked for updates as to the card's issuance on the official website, we just got error messages. And daily

we prayed, please let the cards come!

Finally, The Cards Arrived

Then one day there was a knock on the door and waiting outside was the postman with the registered mail for us containing the national ID cards!

Of course, he wanted to see our national IDs to confirm that we were the right people to receive the envelopes. I explained in my limited Turkish that the IDs were inside the envelopes. After thinking about it for a moment, he allowed me to open the envelopes to show the IDs so that I could officially receive

the envelopes. Finally, we had our special ID cards with the special numbers. *Oh joy!*

In Business

Now we could walk into the bank

with our ID cards, and a few clicks of a mouse, some typing on a keyboard, a signature here and there, and we had a bank account.

Another quick trip to the phone company

branch office and we had working phones. The power of this little plastic card blew down the barriers before us and now we could feel like functioning members of society, with all the rights and responsibilities that entailed.

All this stress about a simple ID card made me wonder, what is the deal with ID anyway? Why do we place such a high emphasis on it?
