to a foundation of sand. When the waves sweep in, such people are at risk to be swept out to sea.

Firmly Fixed

But we are *NOT* called to tread water. We are *NOT* called to drift. *Rather*, we are told to be firmly fixed to a secure foundation. That foundation is the Word of God. My prayer is that we will not fail in our commitment to God and His Word.

As for God, his way is perfect; the word of the LORD is proven; He is a shield to all who trust in Him. 2 Samuel 22:31 (NKJV)

The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God stands forever. Isaiah 40:8 (NKJV)

For this reason, we also thank God without ceasing, because when you received the word of God which you heard from us, you welcomed it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which also effectively works in you who believe. 1 Thessalonians 2:13 (NKJV)


Missionary Christmas Gifts



The Attributes of God

God is Immutable

Editor's Note: This is the fourth part in a series on the Attributes of God.

ot too long ago, I found myself paging through my scrapbook. The last few spreads showed my senior year: competitions, events, senior photos, and prom. And I didn't have to do much investigation to realize that I have changed quite a bit over the past couple of decades. My glasses have been replaced by contacts, my hair is much shorter, and there's a weird vertical line between my eyebrows.

Of course, the changes aren't just physical—my ideas and beliefs have shifted and matured over the years, too. never changes. His character and His nature are the same today as they were before the dawn of time, the same as they will be millennia from now. This attribute of God is called *immutability* and is described in one of those verses many children learn early in life: *"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever"* Hebrews 13:8 (NKJV).

When I consider that I've changed since yesterday (got a haircut, learned something new), I find it almost incomprehensible that God has never changed. And the world around me has changed, too! Technology progresses, my children continue to move towards adulthood, information increases.

People Change!

People change constantly. Our bodies age and morph as our health declines or advances. Life experiences mold our preferences, habits and thinking. As the saying goes, *"The* only constant in life is change."

Now, stop and consider that God

God IS the Constant

Long ago you laid the foundation of the earth and made the heavens with your hands. They will perish, but you remain forever; they will wear out like old clothing. You will change them like a garment and discard them. But you are always the same; you will live forever.

Psalm 102: 25–27 (NLT)

And in the midst of all that, there's a constant: our God. He is as wise, truthful, and loving in this moment as He was in the beginning. His grace and mercy are just as abundant as ever. There's not even any danger that He will run out of patience with His fallible people!





This one attribute alone gives us reason to place complete faith in Him—and informs how we interact with Him!





ew year, same us. A sea of possibilities; but we have a ball chained to our ankle. We cling to the idea of "possibility" as a child clings to their imaginary friend—*hopelessly dreamy*.

Why?

I'm not sure why many of us teens post and celebrate a new year. *Maybe* it's because we like the excuse to stay up late, but this time the rest of the world is awake with us. *Maybe* we like the 2022 recap posts on social media because we feel as though we need to prove we did something with our year. *Maybe* we talk about our New Year's resolution because that's what we're supposed

to do. From my perspective, a New Year means next to nothing.

What Change?

Yes, I love staying up to welcome in the tomorrow; yes, I love making resolutions and posting about the past year. But what change can we really make?

My generation tends to have a defeatist attitude toward our dreams. Which is funny for how hopeful we are. But we tend to believe we've failed before we can even start.

Why? A very common setback we *(teenagers in general)* tend to have is peer pressure. Sure, someone can tell me that I shouldn't care what anyone thinks.



Trust me, I would love if I could walk into a room, confident enough in my title as God's daughter that people's whispers and weird looks didn't bother me.

Confident?

If confidence were that easy, we wouldn't have to fight for

it. Not only do we have peer pressure, but we have the knowledge of our past. All the mistakes we make *over and over* again.

There are some mistakes, sinful habits, bad habits, that we just can't seem to shake, not unlike the skin on our body. There are regrets we have that haunt our nights and shadow our every decision.

Not Easy

If it was easy to wipe our mistakes and regrets, we wouldn't have to fight for a more Christlike version of ourselves. Lack of knowing where to start, and knowing how to start tie up these setbacks quite nicely.

Where to Start?

FIGHT For It!

If doing something new was easy, we wouldn't have to fight for it.

Sooooo, what's my point in telling you all this? Why should I tell you why change is so hard for teens, for everyone, when this is normally a time of hope for change?

My reason is a reminder. To grandparents, to parents, to teens and to everyone in between, I want to give you the reminder that every change is a sacrifice and a fight. It will, most likely, take longer than we plan for our goals to come true.

Stick Together ... And Stick To It!

So let's stick together. Let's make goals, start habits, fight with sweat and blood for that change, with one another. As our parents and leaders, those reading this have the power to


