What Does It Mean to Worship?

f you regularly attend church, when you hear "worship" you might think about singing.

That's what we normally say before we begin a time of corporate musical praise, "join us in worship."

More Than Singing!

But that understanding of worship falls short. Worship is much more than singing *(though musical praise may be an expression of worship)*. Let's stop and consider what **true** worship is.

Scratching the Surface

Before you get any further, I want to warn you that we will only begin to scratch the surface of this important subject. A short article for our monthly publication will not give enough space to address

Christian context, the recipient of our worship is understood to be God.

Got Questions summarizes the words that are translated as worship. These include:

Serving with reverence (latreuo)

Paying homage (proskuneó)

Rendering religious honor (sebázomai)

Revering or adoring (séboma)

Important!

Worship is important. Scripture clearly tells us that we are to honor the Lord with reverence. **Psalm 95:6**

reads, "Oh come, let us worship and bow down; Let us kneel before the Lord our Maker."

(NKJV) There is *not* a shortage of other such passages in Scripture.

So What IS It? *So what is worship? What might it look like?* *Firstly,* true worship should be focused on the one to whom it is intended. Our worship is for God. It is for Him, not us. When we worship God, we are making an offering to Him, whether that be through service, praise, or adoration.



If you purchase a Valentine's gift, you try and buy something that the person *receiving* the gift would like. For this reason, I would not buy my wife coconut candies or tickets to a monster truck show. The same is true when we desire to worship God. *The goal is for His honor and pleasure.* While offering this gift *might* bring us joy, the true intent of worship should be to please God.

Must be Authentic

True worship must be authentic. God does *not* need our worship rather, it is the correct response of His people. When we offer praise, service, and adoration, it should be given with sincere motives. Time and again, God rebukes his people for performing meaningless rituals.

"I hate, I despise your feast days, And I do not savor your sacred assemblies. Though you offer Me burnt offerings and your grain offerings, I will not accept them, nor will I regard your fattened peace offerings. Take away from Me the noise of your songs, For I will not hear the melody of your stringed instruments." Amos 5:21–23 (NKJV)

Needs to be True!

Worship should be true. Jesus told the woman at the well, "... true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth; for the Father is seeking such to worship Him. God is Spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth." John 4:23–24 (NKJV).

Our worship must have an accurate view of God. We must honor Him for who He is. We cannot offer our praises to a distortion of God based on our own desires or imagination that is a form of idolatry. Our desire to honor God should correspond to a desire to know God and to respond correctly.

More Than a Song!

I'm running out of space and we haven't gotten very far. But I hope you already realize that worship *is* much more than our

e serve God and He answers prayers! This clearly can be seen in the recent hiring of our Associate Pastor and other church matters.

The Plan

Our plan to hire an associate pastor began in 2018 upon the recommendation from the transition team. For several reasons, including the social interruptions caused by the pandemic, we did not begin a formal search until early 2022.

Search Team Formed

A search team was formed in the spring of 2022 and they met regularly to pray for direction and to research where to advertise this position.

One candidate was considered mid-summer, but he withdrew his application. After continued prayer for God's leading, Mike Fast's application caught the search team's eye.

The team members all were positive about his credentials, they interviewed him and decided to forward his application to the Elder Board.

Zoom Meeting

After reviewing his file, we set up a zoom interview in late November. There was a positive consensus in the Elder Board to move forward and a candidate weekend was set for early January.

Mike met privately with **Pastor Troy** to further discuss the responsibilities of the position. Then Galen and Jonell Harms took Mike and Lora on a tour of the area. Saturday afternoon there was a dinner provided by our excellent kitchen crew for the chair people of committees, their spouses and church staff to meet them and to have a time for questions.

Positive Vote

Then, Mike shared in the services on Sunday morning and hosted a question and answer session after a potluck in the church gym after the morning services. Following that the congregation met to pray and vote on calling Mike Fast as our new associate pastor. There was an overwhelmingly positive affirmation vote to offer the position to Mike.

I called him that evening and he accepted the position.

Living Arrangements

He and Lora had planned on staying in their small travel trailer while they looked for a house to purchase. The Elders wanted them to have better accommodations, so we took on the task of cleaning and painting the small house on Ash Street which was gifted to the church two years ago. Several people were involved in painting and cleaning the interior, including Andrew and Gabe Connelly, Joe and Sue Cacka, Darrell Hebenthol, Ian McFarland, under the direction of Annie Demmick, to do a "facelift" of the interior.

Colleen Shinn directed the stocking of their pantry and refrigerator. Many in the congregation contributed to this. When I met and opened the door upon their arrival, they were astonished at how great it looked! Good job, team!

There was an overwhelmingly positive affirmation vote to offer the position to Mike.

Mike and Lora will be staying at the Ash street house for as long as they want while looking for a house here in the Dallas area. God answers prayer in 3 ways: "WAIT", "NO" or *"YES*".

This van not only has the features we need, but Bill and Willard found it in Salem! There was no need to go to the mid–west to buy a van or order it from the factory and wait a year to get it. Now we can move forward with the shuttle ministry to assist our friends at DRV.

s I mentioned last month, the FEBC Directors met in January to discuss the direction and vision of the FEBC. These meetings were very productive, and I am pleased with the sense of unity and shared values that these men demonstrate, even though they represent different places and diverse backgrounds. Thank you for your prayers.

As part of our discussion there, we reviewed the progress of our Vision Statement: *"Strengthening our churches with timely resources that strengthen their leaders."*

Engaging with Churches

An interesting thing happened over this past year. We produced less new resources than we had hoped, which seems disheartening, but the reason we were unable to produce more resources is very exciting. The production of resources was slowed by the amount of time we spent actually engaged with our member churches, helping them solve problems. That is **exactly** what we intended the new resources to do.

Our goal last year was to produce at least six new resources. We produced five new resources, along with connecting our churches to other types of help and providing formal and informal training on our resources.

Providing Direct Assistance

But recently, I reviewed the ways in which we provide direct assistance to our churches. Our Ministries Coordinator, **Gary Krehbiel**, and I contacted every one of our member churches last year. The exciting thing is that many of these interactions resulted in providing direct, meaningful support to the church.

We provided a broad range of assistance, such as dealing with a crisis, troubleshooting a specific concern, discussing methods to improve ministry, or teaching someone how to properly use one of our resources. In fact, last year we recorded meaningful assistance provided to 37 of our 41 churches! Many of these



churches engaged our services more than once.

Praise God he is using us to make an impact on your church. That is what our Vision Statement is all about.

magine a day where you don't stop to eat, drink, or even rest. Sure, you might accomplish a lot more in that 24-hour timespan, but what condition would you be in at the end of the day? What if you had no air during that time? It's a silly question, because we all know no one can live without air for even a few minutes.

Some Needs

In addition to air, food, drink, and rest, humans need shelter and clothing to survive. And to have a healthy and happy life, you can add GODFIDENCE things like medicine,

safety, relationships, and resources

to the list of musthaves. While we, in our American culture, often like to think of ourselves as independent, it's clear that we require a wide assortment of necessities for survival and health on this planet.

What DOES God Need?

But God needs nothing. Have you ever really thought about that? God sustains Himself. There's nothing that He needs-nothing! He didn't even need to be created because He has always existed.

Check out John 5:26 — "For just as the Father has life in Himself, so also He has granted to the Son to have life in Himself." (CSB)

Our Label

Reliance On God's Promises

We call this attribute **selfexistent**, and it's one of those incommunicable attributes that can't be imitated or demonstrated

by people.

And yet... somehow, we try. We try to appear self-

reliant and invincible, brushing off hurts and covering up vulnerabilities. In a way, we try to be God. And we fail—repeatedly. Because we aren't God. and we can't Because we aren't God, and we can't be. We were created with needs. created to need God. We need Him

to sustain us throughout each day. As the worship song says, "He's the breath in our lungs." He is necessary for every moment of each day. He is the supplier of *everything* we could ever need.

Admitting Our Short-Comings

So, how does our interaction with God change when we admit our lack of *self—existence and choose instead to rely* on Him?

Well, when we realize that God needs absolutely nothing from us, but still chooses to pursue relationship with us, that's a pretty big thing. We can learn to enjoy our relationship and interactions with Him, instead of feeling like we need to somehow earn it.

His Strength Over Our Weakness

We can begin to be vulnerable with God and learn how His strength meets every one of our weaknesses. Even when we think He isn't meeting those needs quickly enough or to the extent that we would hope, we must trust His sustenance for us.

In addition, as we remember that He is the very breath in our lungs,

the supplier of all of our needs, our constant response should be to pour out praise to Him. We praise Him for what He has given us, for what He has done in our lives, for what He has done despite our sinful desires and actions.

What About...?

And how about our interactions with others? How are they impacted by the self-existence of God? I think this is where it is important to acknowledge how each person has needs and failings—weaknesses, as it were. And as we interact with others, those weaknesses can lead to hurt or offense.

But God's grace can fill in those spaces—*if we're willing.* We can learn to depend on God when others fail us, to offer His grace to them. And when we fail those around us, we can let our response to that situation point to God and the work He is doing in our lives.

Reliance on God

We *aren't* self-existent. But we have a God who is, and we can depend on Him to meet all of our needs, to be everything we can't. *What a great reason to praise Him!* ⁴

aving been raised during my youth in Southern California, UCLA was my favorite college football team. Our high school team used the same offense ("single wing" formation) as UCLA, and in the fall of my sophomore year I decided I would like to try out for the "B" team as a pulling guard. I had formerly been known as a pretty good sprinter, and that seemed to be just the right position for me to play on the team.

A pulling guard, always positioned on the opposite side of the center of where the ball carrier was to run, was to pull and cross behind the offensive line, and then block out one of the opposing team's linesmen or linebackers to clear the way for the running back to advance the ball forward toward the end zone.

Short-Lived Career

Having entered as a freshman

weighing about 100 pounds and being 5'2" tall, (I have since put on an additional 15 pounds and grown an additional 4" in height!) one doesn't need to

have much of an imagination to figure out how short–lived my pulling guard career lasted!

Clearing the Way

A decade later, a "prof" of mine (at the time Chaplain for the Dallas *Cowboys)* mentioned a man in the early beginnings of the Church whom he dubbed as their "blocking back" (same assignment as a pulling guard, but just a different position in the backfield). This individual was infamous for clearing the way for others on the "team" to have success in the positions assigned to them by their Owner and Head Coach.

Pigskin Terminology

Utilizing some more "pigskin" terminology, here are some examples of him doing this very thing in the book of Acts:

Providing financial support to assist the Jerusalem coaching staff in instructing and training the newlyformed league of Jewish players [4:32-37; see 2:42].

Introducing and recommending a prospective player with a poor track record to the skeptical Jerusalem coaching staff, and who later was forced to leave town [9:26-30].

ission Connexion 2023 impacted more than just our sleep schedules. It impacted our relationships, our thinking and the limits to our comfort zones. It was a weekend that God used to impact the five students and three leaders in a great contagious way.

Great Opportunity

Because of the small group that went, we all got to know each other on a much more personal level. From the very first thirty minutes in the van to the end of the trip, opinions and ideas were being thrown every which way and being debated.

You could have called our group *chaotic* and *loud*. But I saw a group that was coming from a variety of experiences and backgrounds who were willing to share our thoughts with one another. **AND** discuss these thoughts.

Did we disagree with the worship song? We talked about it and came to our own conclusions with the insight from one another.

Do we have separate methods of expressing our feelings? **YES**, so we explained our reasonings for our

opinions, realizing that this went to a much deeper level than just preferences.

It didn't matter what the subject was, we all had different opinions. **BUT** we didn't let that divide us. No, we leveraged it to grow our thinking, test our beliefs and firm up our opinions. Little did we know the topic of the weekend would push us to expand the answers to our faith.

Special Visitor

One of the visitors at Mission Connexion was an organization called Ambassadors. Ambassadors mission is to "Train Portland area youth, and those who equip them, to know God's truth and think biblically, so that they can recognize and refute falsehoods, and initiate respectful discussions with non-believers and those who have turned away from the Christian faith." Three of our students went to their first workshop which discussed five of the most common objections to the Christian Faith. It covered the anger relating to Christians being hypocrites, the pain and the sorrow we see in this world, the judgment of God and more. The weekend was amazing. I think we all want to learn more about apologetics and go further with our knowledge of the Bible. I think some of us also realized that there was more we could be doing as ambassadors of our faith.

Additional Benefit

And we all have a much deeper understanding of one another which I hope we will use to encourage each other to go deeper into our personal relationship with the Lord. ¹

Scouting out another newly–forming Gentile league in Antioch in behalf of the Jerusalem staff **[11:19–24]**.

Recruiting that former badly-reputed player in Tarsus to join the Antioch coaching staff [11:25–26].

Being sent to Jerusalem with this newest coach on the Antioch staff with funds to assist their beleaguered staff and players [11:27–30].

Being sent out with this same newest coach with an endorsement of the Antioch staff to start up new teams for a world-wide Gentile league, with his young cousin in tow [13:1– 5; see 12:25; Colossians 4:10].

Starting out as the team leader, he gradually allowed his fellow coach to take on that primary role [13:2,7b; 14:12,14; 15:12–13:43,46; 15:2,2,22,25,35].



Returning from their road trip, the Gentile and Jewish leagues had some dissention over rule differences, and he and his fellow coach went from Antioch to Jerusalem to successfully settle the matter, resulting in the peaceful merging of both leagues **[15:1-4,12,22,30-35]**.

Later, having a rift with this fellow recruiting coach over his young cousin who had earlier quit their team, he took this young man with him to start more teams in the Cyprus Division **[15:36-39].**

Apparently, he was able to so train his young cousin that even his former fellow-coach, facing retirement, recognized this gifted young man was now capable to take on a position as a coach-player on his own team [see 2 Timothy 4:11].
