ave you ever been the new kid? Do you remember feeling nervous and wondering if you would fit in? I certainly do.

Many Moves

Growing up, my family moved a lot. By the time I started high school I had already been in five different school districts. For my sister, **Julie**, it wasn't too challenging. She was outgoing and made friends easily. Each stop was a

But it was harder for me—it always took me more than a year to get settled. And then, *just as I finally began to feel connected*, we were moving again.

Some Positives...

new adventure.

There were definitely some positive takeaways. I think this experience caused me to be aware of others who were new and unattached. Knowing what it felt like to be on the outside has given me some sympathy for people in similar situations. This is

a value that should extend to our faith—we should have open hearts to welcome people into fellowship, *not* only with ourselves *but* with the Savior.

Make Disciples

The Great Commission given by Jesus tells us to make disciples. We are not to be content with

study, fellowship, and praise. Instead, we are to be taking the message of Salvation outside the church walls into our communities, families, and affinity

groups. The command "to go" (also translated "as you are going") has an outward focus. We are supposed to be adding new people.

Sad Times?

Now, in this present day, church attendance and the value of religion (any religion) seem to be on the wane. A more nebulous and selfdetermined spirituality seems to be the spirit of the age. Going to church

used to be a cultural value. Today, fewer people are self–motivated to attend on Sunday morning.

No advertisement, sign, or clever promotion will necessarily bring the motivation to attend a service for which there is not a perceived need or benefit.

Aware and Intentional

Because of this, when we have a visitor, we need to be even more aware and intentional. This was always true, but it is even more important now. The old adage goes, "you never get a second chance to make a first impression."

If someone visits EBC will they feel wanted and welcomed? Do we view

our services through the eyes of a firsttime guest?

No Compromise!

Let me take a minute to interrupt this train of thought. I want to be clear. We are *not* compromising our values or watering down our message. The culture's call for inclusivity and sensitivity do *not* supersede the truth of God and our obedience to His Word. There are churches that have gone down that road—that is not our direction.

However, there is a difference between compromise and hospitality. There is a difference between being inward focused and looking outward.

Friendly?

If you were to ask any church body, almost all congregations list "being friendly" as one of their strengths. Sadly, numerous surveys indicate that this is *not* the impression that many first—time visitors have when attending those same congregations.

It is normal for regular attenders to feel welcome. They are happy to see their friends, they easily can engage in conversation with familiar faces, they know where the bathrooms are



and what style of dress is deemed acceptable. For the visitor, however, they can feel lost and overlooked as the regular crowd engages with one another.

We need to be friendly.

We need to remember what it is like to be new—and then to treat unfamiliar faces in the manner in which we would like to be treated.

Our Elder Board recently completed the book, "Becoming a Welcoming Church" by **Thom**Rainer. It is a quick and easy read. At the same time, it contains many practical and powerful insights on how we can do better. I would encourage you to consider picking up the book and reading it. It would be worth your time.

In closing, we are told to

"go." It is *not* enough to wait for people to come to us. We *need* to take the message of Jesus out and into the community. At the same time, if we are actually blessed to have people enter our doors without invitation or work on our behalf, we *need* to be ready. Our outward focus *needs* to be a way of life, whether we are at work or sitting in the pew. Let's keep our eyes open and share the love of Jesus with someone new.

couple weeks ago Lora and I attended a birthday party for our youngest grandson in an airplane. It was a parked KC–97 Stratofreighter, a large four engine air–to–air refueling tanker from the 1940's. It would have been a unique perspective and point of observation.

Part of ANY Job

Clear observations are an important part of any job done well. Years ago, **Air Force Colonel John Boyd** developed a process to be used in combat operations. Interestingly, the concept has since been used

in various commercial operations, learning processes, game theory, and yes, could even be applied in pastoring churches. It is referred to as the **OODA loop**, which refers to the cycle of **O**bserve, **O**rient, **D**ecide, and **A**ct.

communication classes. I functioned


for two years as a Trustee (Regional Representative) within the Conservative Baptist

In 1950, Allan and Selma and their daughters **Ruth** and **Marilyn** sailed to

Belgium to study French for a year before going as missionaries to Congo in 1951. **Janet** was born in Congo in 1952, and **Gordon** was born in Omaha, Nebraska in 1956. In 1960, Congo received their independence from Belgium and all the missionaries from the eight stations of the Congo Inland Mission evacuated through Angola because of the unrest in Congo.

and through Connect Groups.




WE READ THE WORD.

wonder how often we miss the blessings of God—perhaps even miracles—that are right in front of us? I do not want to hyperbolize the importance nor the drama of my experiences these past few weeks, but perhaps there is something to learn from

A few weeks ago, I was suffering with a sinus infection and started my normal regimen of over-the-counter medications. By the end of the week, I was recovering, and enjoyed a trip to Saskatchewan as scheduled. I had the privilege of preaching in Indian Head and

Melissa and I participated in the SK Pastors and Wives Retreat. By the end of the retreat, I felt almost normal.

But on the drive home, my symptoms started to worsen, and soon I was miserable again. For nearly a week I steadily declined, until I finally relented and went to the doctor for antibiotics. With that treatment, I am gradually getting back to normal.

Within the past week I have had multiple moments of asking God why he would inflict an illness on me for three weeks, when I have so much to do! I have recovered from similar afflictions many times without antibiotics and in shorter time. It has been frustrating.

But recently, something else occurred to me. That first week of illness, my wife and I and several of our friends prayed fervently that God would give me the strength to make it to Canada and fulfill my commitments there. He answered that prayer powerfully! After my sermon that Sunday, my wife and I were both amazed that I had not coughed at all.

I was too ill to preach or to be very sociable the day before the trip and the day after. God provided exactly the reprieve we had prayed for, and



I almost missed this little miracle, because I was thinking "why am I sick again?" rather than "how did I feel well in the midst of sickness?"

Prayer is powerful. I wonder how often we miss that—even when it is right before our eyes?

t's Monday morning. I flip the laundry on my way to the kitchen and pick up two items that need to be put in the dishwasher. A few breakfast items still need to be put away, and then there's something on the kitchen table that can go back to my office as I head that way. Back at work, I send reminders about an upcoming event, work my way through email, and set priorities for the workday.

I'd like to turn on the electric fireplace and curl up with a blanket and a book after a busy weekend, but that choice isn't the right one for today. Others are depending on my work, and if I'm not faithful today, it will cause problems for tomorrow.

A Fruit of the Spirit!

Faithfulness! What is it, and how do we live it out? Faithfulness is a fruit of the spirit. An article I read (https://www.gcu.edu/blog/spiritual-life/weekly-devotional-fruit-spirit-faithfulness) tied the



s we begin to explore the concept of *faithfulness*, we move from incommunicable attributes—those which can only be shown by God—to communicable attributes. We haven't covered all of the incommunicable attributes, but I would encourage you to search out a list of those and work through them on your own. Discover what each one means, and then consider how it impacts your view of God and how it influences your interactions with others.

trait to loyalty and trust. My loyalty to my family motivates me to care for their day—to—day needs regardless of my level of desire to do so, and they can trust that I will continue to do so.

Two-Way Thing

When I look at faithfulness in light of my relationship with God, I see that it's a two—way thing. God's faithfulness has never failed me (or any person to live before or after me, for that matter)...and I am called to grow in faithfulness in my relationship with Him.

It's easy to remember the "Abrahamlevel" faithfulness and think that I have to live up to that measure: pulling my entire family up by the roots to start a new nation or being willing to sacrifice a child to God. But the truth of it is, while I may be called to huge acts, the majority of my faithfulness will likely be lived out in the day—today, the small decisions and moments that are easily discounted or forgotten.

And the more I consider and observe God's faithfulness to me, the more I notice it. Remembering the times he stretched our meager food budget reminds me of all of the hand—me—down clothes that were given to us when three kids seemed to grow out of shirts and shoes faster than we could supply them.

A small gift from a ministry partner causes me to think over decades of faithful gifts from a myriad of people standing behind us in ministry. And then I remember God's provision extends beyond my life to thousands and millions of Christ–followers

As she was leaving, I asked her her name. She smiled that wide smile again in my direction and replied,

"Jaime."

s many of you know, I am starting a new chapter in my life. This is a new season without my best friend, my partner for the last 38 years, my beloved Sharon who is now rejoicing with the Lord.

Sharon and I have always had a heart for serving the Lord. We were always active in our local church with VBS, choir, Sunday School, etc. Any event involving food, Sharon was right there in the kitchen.

A Further Step

We took all that a step further in 1994 and went on the road for almost four years in a service ministry with several different groups. We served at Bible camps, Christian schools, churches, and other ministries helping out where we could. Much of our service was through an RV ministry called **SOWERS**. Inspiration

About thirty years ago, a missionary spoke at our church how he was going to the mission field in a supporting role. Until that time, I had always thought of missionaries living in the jungle someplace translating and teaching the Bible. I had no idea there were other things to do. Then, I heard about Stephen in Acts 6.



Now I am no Bible scholar, I am terrible with languages, and, honestly, sometimes not that great of a people person. But, I do know how to wait on tables! Growing up poor, any time something needed fixing around the house, we did it ourselves rather than hiring it out. God taught

Acts 6:2-6

So the Twelve gathered all the disciples together and said, "It would not be right for us to neglect the ministry of the word of God in order to wait on tables. Brothers, choose seven men from among you who are known to be full of the Spirit and wisdom. We will turn this responsibility over to them and will give our attention to prayer and the ministry of the word." This proposal pleased the whole group. They chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit; also Philip, Procorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolas from Antioch, a convert to Judaism. They presented these men to the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them. (NIV)

me these life skills and allowed me to use them serving others. So, handling plumbing, electrical, and other basic repairs, fixing broken windows, taking out the trash, and other kinds of "grunt labor" became my service to Him. And, like Stephen, I did occasionally teach and share the Gospel. Fortunately, I was not stoned for it, although there may have been an occasional rotten tomato sent my way.

Hope House

"Hope House exists to provide a home for children who are emotionally impaired, developmentally disabled, and/or come from disrupted adoptions or dysfunctional families."

Hope House is home to approximately 25 young people

Always needing care and tending, as well as changes as time, programs, and needs develop.

After leaving Hope House, I will take a little R&R time in Wyoming doing some camping, exploring, visiting, and participating in some special ham radio activities.

On To Nebraska!

My next stop will be at **Bethel Bible Camp in Wellfleet**, **Nebraska**, a ministry of InFaith.
There I will be assisting EBC supported missionaries **Kevin and Jennifer Domes**. Serving on the maintenance staff, I will be getting things ready for the camper season

Finding SOWERS

Then we discovered SOWERS. For almost four years we traveled the country, serving at churches, Bible Camps, and other ministries, working over 35 projects.

One Month At a Time

A SOWERS project is typically a one month commitment. You can pick the projects you want with the types of ministries and locations you feel led to serve. You can work as much or as little as you like, one project per year or twelve projects per year, or anything in between. You will indeed be blessed by the experience.

What is the SOWER Ministry?

The SOWER (Servants On Wheels Ever Ready) Ministry is a non–profit, non-denominational Christian RV work ministry that provides volunteer help to selected non–profit Christian ministries.

Where Can I Volunteer?
