Need Adjustment?

It will take adjustments. But God is not arbitrary in His work. He is still doing great things. He is still working through people and changing lives.


It is my prayer that I would embrace the change that God would do in my life and my church. I want to be brought into conformity with His will. I want to be brought into alignment. 🕆



Perhaps a better way of phrasing this myth would be something more to do with people thinking that being in difficult times means that you messed up, or if you are in a valley of hardship, you must have taken a wrong turn.

Let's consider five points as we discuss this myth.

Our craving for something to be true can distort truth.

A prosperity preacher declared that if you get spiritually rich then you will be financially rich, and great faith will keep you from illness or harm. In other words, he is declaring that if you always feel close to God then you can avoid any difficulties in your life.

At some point it sounds like we would rather have a genie than a sovereign God. Don't let your craving for comfort or abundance cause you to distort that which is really true.

Our distortion of truth can result in the wrong conclusions.

If we want a certain thing, and distort the truth to justify the declaration of our desires, then it will lead to places and situations where we are going to be severely disappointed. If we begin to reason that because I want comfort, that

therefore God will only bring me comfort; or because I want a pain—free life, God will never allow me to experience trials or suffering; then as soon as we feel distant from God or not

experiencing what we believed we should experience, then we have a problem.

Biblical truth teaches us that difficult times will come.

In **1 Peter 4:12**, the apostle Peter informs Christians that trials will come along to test our faith.

Our difficulties right now also produce something in us that pain-free living cannot produce.

James 1:2-4 and Romans
5:3-5 tell us that the testing of our

faith produces some great qualities; endurance, character and hope.

Being prepared for difficult times will prevent additional problems.

When someone who doesn't want to believe they will ever go through a valley finds themselves in a valley, even though they have not made a wrong turn or done something wrong to deserve it, they start blaming God and other people, or they try really hard to hide what they are going through.

No one in the Bible was immune to the valleys.


- Prepare for difficult times now.



ommunication is so important yet so complicated! Did you know that in terms of people talking with one another, less than 10% of actual communication are the words we use?

Our voice inflections, gestures, and other non-verbal body language add the rest to the messages we convey to another person.

MIScommunication

As you can guess, this easily leads to miscommunication.
One of our goals as the Elder team is to improve the process of how leadership communicates with our congregation.

Good Progress

In the past several years, there has been good progress through an improved web site, improvements in what *The Sentinel* magazine covers, our twice annual all—committee chair meeting, and our annual town hall meeting.



Our intent is continued improvement to have clear and complete communication between the leadership and the congregation.

The Ultimate Communicator

The ultimate communication comes from God our Father.

If He had not initiated communication with us, we would not have a clue as to His existence.

The Bible tells us that the most obvious way He communicates is *through* His creation. **Psalm 19:1** tells

us, "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament shows His handiwork."

(NKJV). People who believe in evolution have a very difficult time handling questions like "Why would evolution spawn beautiful flowers?" or "Why are there simple pleasures?" It is easy for us as Christians to answer that—because God wants His people to enjoy Him and His creation.

Psalm 16:11 states "You (God) will show me the path of life; in Your presence is fulness of joy, at Your right hand are pleasures forevermore." (NKJV)

Through His Word

The second way God clearly communicates with us is through His Word, the Bible. Paul writes in 2 Timothy 3:16, "ALL Scripture is given by inspiration of God,

and is profitable for doctrine, reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work." (NKJV).

No Breakfast...?

I remember **Janice Peters** telling our family when we visited her in Mozambique, that in the early years of her mission work that the director would tell the team, "no Bible, no breakfast." Devotions are important, although sometimes I read while I eat breakfast—I wonder what the SIM team leader would say to that?

Essential Ingredient

Reading the Bible daily is essential to good spiritual health. Alongside this, I like to have input from trusted devotional books to fill in my understanding. Three of my favorite devotional books are:

"Daily Light for Every **Day**" originally by Jonathan Bagster and updated in language by Anne **Graham Lotz.** This is a daily devotion that uses the Word of God to comment on itself; there is a key verse for each day, then a dozen or so verses that help understand the key verse—no human comments in this devotional. What is unique about it is that it was written about 200 years ago by a father for his family and continues to sell today. Billy Graham's family used it.

He then made a way through His own death and resurrection for us to be forgiven from sin and to gain entrance to heaven. I am eternally grateful that God reached out to us and continues to communicate with us through His Holy Spirit.

How to Best Do It?

So then, brothers and sisters how can we best improve our communication with each other as the Body of Christ? By following His Word: "Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but what is good for necessary edification that

it may impart grace to the hearers." Ephesians 4:29 (NKJV).

We can encourage one another if our communication is kind and gracious, and so be obedient to the Word of God. •

high in the Andes mountains, a sharp contrast to the lowland town of Horeb where the ministry site is which the Burkes have constructed for the classes. Dan teaches the men and trains them to be church leaders, and Judy teaches the women.

When we add the failure of *not* meeting the expectations placed on ourselves as moms and as believers, we forget to focus on the truths that we know, instead we focus on lies.

One of my favorite verses is **1 Corinthians 15:58**,

"Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord

your labor is not in vain." (ESV)

Turn to God

Our Real Mom workbook has a fantastic outline of God's Truths to remember when the "I—

We are not ultimately in charge, He is. There is nothing we can do that is beyond His healing and grace in their lives.



I really do hope and pray that Mom to Mom can provide the environment and experiences that can help share the load.

We're not here to tell moms that life is roses and rainbows or even rough and rocky and they have to deal. We're here to say we get it. We struggle with some of the same roses and thorns and we want to help them be the best mom God created them to be.

ecently a piano teacher claimed that she wasn't selling piano instruction, but rather patience—in 30- and 45-minute increments.

As a piano teacher myself, I could relate. Some days it seems I spend more time repeating myself as I work to have students focus on the material than I do teaching concepts. Twenty—five years of teaching piano lessons has grown my patience—and that's the attribute of God I'd like to discuss this month.

What Is Patience?

The Oxford dictionary defines patience as the capacity to accept or tolerate delay, trouble, or suffering without getting angry or upset.

When I think about God's patience, I think I'd like to add that God "tolerates" our delays, trouble, and suffering with an unending love. It's more than just not expressing negative feelings—He consistently

responds to our wrong behaviors, our slowness to learn, with love and grace.

Multiple Levels

God displays patience on *two* levels.

On a global level, He has been displaying patience with mankind for millennia. Think of the countless generations He has observed, the lives that have run together as His sovereign plan unfolds. Never has He rushed a step or had to go back and redo something because he hurried the process. Not once has He had to apologize because He treated someone wrongly out of impatience (or any other motive).

And His patience extends to us on a personal level. He gently, patiently leads us along His path, guiding us when we falter or wander. Even when we repeat the same mistake time after time, He patiently loves us. *What a gift!*

Strive to be Like Him!

Since patience is a quality of God that we can echo, we should strive to offer patience to each person we encounter, and in each situation we experience. Patience shapes the way we interact with others, giving the benefit of the doubt and offering grace where needed. Patience spurs us to react with love when a child or student fails to complete a task, when a comment from a friend or spouse feels obvious or unnecessary.

When We Are Impatient...

Keep in mind that impatience is self–focused. When we are impatient, we fail to show empathy or compassion. Instead, all we see is the inconvenience we experience.

We must learn to use those feelings of impatience to spur us to compassion and empathy.

What IF...

What if, instead of expressing frustration about the amount of time a cashier takes to ring up our items, we consider possible reasons behind their lack of haste—and then take a moment to look them in the eye and

ask about their day? What if, instead of lecturing the child who has once again failed to meet an expectation (and made us late), we take a moment to hug them and connect with their heart? We might discover that the issue causing them to drag their feet is far more important than the few minutes of work we missed.

How We Interact with God

Patience also shapes the way we interact with God, and I believe this comes from a place of trust. When we trust that He is working His plan, that He has a purpose for each incident, we can rest in Him instead of impatiently whining and complaining to Him.

A heart that fully trusts God will patiently endure suffering (Romans 12:12). A heart that exercises patience shows humility, recognizing that our timeline is less important than God's timeline (Ecclesiastes 7:8). A patient heart continually brings those things that cause us to feel anxious and uptight—impatient—to God, trusting Him to work them out (Philippians 4:6).

Where It Comes From

In the end, patience comes from trusting God's timing rather than our own and seeking to show His love to those around us. Learning this quality takes time—but that's okay because God has unending patience with us!

or those of you who do not know this, and as a reminder for those that do, **Nat and Sylvia Thomas** and their 4 daughters served with Romania Outreach Ministries and lived in Romania for 7 years. Nat taught at the Caransebes Bible Institute there and one of the students was **Diana Penisoara**.

After Diana graduated, she moved to Mozambique to serve with SIM and worked closely with **Janice Peters**. Diana married a Mozambican, **Josue Bulande**, and they have five beautiful children.

ast year in July, we were able to visit Romania after almost five years on the mission field in Mozambique.

Our two younger daughters have never been to Romania before. It was also my first visit not having my dad there (he passed away, on Christmas morning, 2021). It was a beautiful, blessed and busy time spent reconnecting with many friends and relatives, visiting churches and people, spending time with family and friends...it was precious.

Blessings and Farewells

One of the many blessings was the house we were able to purchase. We would like to thank EBC for responding to this need and helping us purchase this house.

On March 21, 2023, we said goodbye to family and friends in Romania and started our journey back to Mozambique. We were excited and looked forward to getting back, but we were also



nervous and a little worried about the long trip ahead of us—especially after hearing about the roads being badly affected by a cyclone just a month before.

Long Journey!

It was a very long journey, flying from Romania to South Africa where our car was. Then, we had

a long drive from there to Lichinga, in the north of Mozambique. Altogether we covered about 2,500 km (1,553 miles) on our road trip! Although it was a

hard and long trip, we clearly saw God's hand and protection over us.

roof up before the next rainy season begins, the children have started their homeschool and they enjoy the afternoons with friends and neighbors.


Stent: Please pray that God's will will be done in the elections taking place in Turkey on May 15.
