
ast month we began our
Mythbusters series with the
myth that "Christians will
always feel close to God." Next
month's myth is that "God is only
love." But for this month, the myth
is that "Doing Good Means You
Receive Good," which is yet another
myth that caters to our culture and
our desires.

The notion that "Doing good means that we should receive good" is an attempt mankind makes to answer the questions; "What is the reason I do the good I do? What's the point? Where's the good karma in this situation?"

Karma?

Most of us are familiar with the Eastern religions' idea of karma, embraced by Buddhists and Hindus, where your destiny is based upon your works and deeds—actually not much different than Mormonism or any other world religion.

And although Christians say they don't believe and embrace the idea of

karma, I have seen those who act like functional Buddhists. They look at the world around them and believe

that they deserve good because they have been good.

False Teachers Around Us

This is *exactly* what the Pharisees were guilty of, following this system of law and rules in order to receive reward. *Some* false teachers today teach that you receive good by doing certain

things, everything from following certain rules to believing that your faith and goodness are enough to get you more goodies. Do good to get good.

I have four quick points I want to make, and the first is this;

Christian karma is an idea we think we want, but with that we would only get what we deserve.

There's something narcissistically appealing about thinking that if I do something good today, that God is then obligated to grant me my first of three wishes.

Joel Osteen, pastor of one of the largest churches in America, and a teacher of this messed—up karma, wrote a book called, *It's Your Time*. In it (pg. 48) he wrote; "When you're in difficult times it's good to remind

God what you've done. 'God, I kept my family in church. God, I've gone the extra mile to help others. I've given.

I've served. I've been faithful.' In your own time of need you should call in all those seeds you've sown."

That is horrible teaching. The biblical truth is that we deserve death because of our sinful rebellion against God (Romans 6:23).

Karma is *not* the solution, but there *is* a solution, *and it's called grace*.

Grace is the better ■option, because you get better than you deserve (see Ephesians 2:4–9).

It's not your own doing. It's not the result of works. We don't get to boast and remind God about all those good seeds we've sown, and how we've given and served. **No.**

Grace comes as a gift from God through the work and sacrifice of Jesus Christ. Grace is how we are saved from what we truly deserve.

Don't do good to get good. When a deficient teacher encourages people to keep

track of their good deeds and remind God of all the good things they've done in order to force God's hand to shower them with blessings, then that teacher is implying that we serve and worship only to get something good for ourselves, not because Jesus did something good for us, but that we serve Him to get good things for us.

Victoria Osteen stood in front of thousands and declared: "When we obey God, we're not doing it for God... we're doing it for ourself. Because God takes pleasure when we're happy. Do good because God wants you to be happy. When you come to church, when you worship Him, you're not doing it for God, really. You're doing it for yourself because that's what makes God happy."

That violates *everything* we read about the heroes of faith in **Hebrews 11**. f

Do good because you already received good.

If we received nothing other than




the love Jesus Christ demonstrated on the cross, then we have received far more good than we have ever deserved, and it should compel us to demonstrate our thanks by doing what He would want us to do.

Let me close with a thought and a poem. The thought is this: God is far more concerned with our character than our comfort. Our desire for comfort shaped both the first myth and this second one as well.

Powerful Words!

It was a Civil War soldier who was said to have penned the following:



I asked God for strength, that I might achieve. I was made weak, that I might learn humbly to obey...

I asked for health, that I might do great things. I was given infirmity, that I might do better things...

I asked God for riches, that I might be happy. I was given poverty, that I might be wise...

I asked for power, that I might have the praise of men. I was given weakness, that I might feel the need of God...

I asked for all things, that I might enjoy life. I was given life, that I might enjoy all things...

I got nothing I asked for—but everything that I had hoped for.

Almost despite myself, my unspoken prayers were answered.

I am, among men, most richly blessed! 🕆

Elders' Epistle

here have been a number of game shows that had a mystery prize behind a door or curtain and if you won you got to look behind the curtain to see the surprise.

Sometimes in churches it seems a mystery how decisions are

made or the structures of leadership. Last year I wrote an article about some of the inner workings of our leadership structure here at EBC. This month I would like to look again at this theme with some additional information.



Every church has some form of governance, whether formally established or informally created out of necessity.

There are typically four main components to a formal church governance plan. These components include:

- 1) congregation membership
- 2) pastoral staff



3) a governing board (*Elders* or *Deacons*, *depending* on the *denomination*), and ...

4) supervisory direction from the denomination district headquarters (*in our case*

Fellowship of Evangelical Bible Church [FEBC]).

First Steps

One of the first governance system decision steps is to set and implement the church's vision is to decide which of these "components" will provide leadership and which "component" will provide management.

Unfortunately, there is no one perfect system. Each system faces its own weaknesses and dangers in power and conflict. Some churches utilize the congregation members as the leadership system. A weakness to this system is that it frequently stalls progress due to having as many opinions as people involved.

Other churches utilize the senior pastor as their main direction setter and give him "carte blanche" authority for leadership issues.

While this model is highly efficient, over time there is risk of the pastor developing unhealthy autocratic control. Other churches use a governing board but can have a similar problem if it becomes overly controlling and creates ministry problems or conflicts. Still other

churches rely on direct supervisory direction from their umbrella denomination.

However, churches need to be responsible for their own people and individual congregations. Denominations are *not* capable of shepherding individual congregations.

How to Avoid Pitfalls?

The questions then are ...

How do we avoid the pitfalls in these styles?

How do we avoid becoming embroiled in power struggles and conflict?

How do we develop unity instead of strife?

Many churches fall when they fail to carefully address such dangers.

The Key: BALANCE!

We believe a balance of the four components described above is a key to minimizing problems and maximizing a focus on the ministry God has given us. Balance in a healthy governing system means utilizing the strengths in each.

First, we acknowledge the congregation has collective wisdom and needs to be involved in making major decisions, such as selecting pastoral staff and approving the main church budget. However, the congregation should *not* direct minor decisions as it can slow down actual ministry and operating efficiency and effectiveness.

We also hold that major leadership decisions such as setting vision, establishing policies and procedures, and caring for the spiritual guidance

of the church are the responsibilities of the Elder Board.

At EBC, the Senior Pastor is a member of the Elder Board and participates in moving forward on these essential leadership responsibilities. It is important to note that the Elder Board has its authority as a unified team but that each individual member of Elder Board does not have authority in themselves.

Equally Important Role

The Pastoral staff have a different, yet equally important, role in the functioning of our church. They plan the worship service, preach, teach, encourage folks with visitation, plan for youth meetings and retreats, as well as perform weddings and funerals.

Our Leadership Team

The Elder team and the Pastoral team together with **Pastor Troy** serving on both teams makes up our EBC Leadership Team. The elders and pastors have different roles in our church but together we all serve you, the congregation, as the leadership team. We will meet

all together three times a year for planning and updating.

Our Extended Team

Finally, we believe that our umbrella FEBC denomination office is a resource for us to consult with as needed for general direction and advice. And we collaborate with them on our stance regarding significant current culture issues.

Keeping Him FIRST!

Regardless of our governance system, our church will only avoid common church pitfalls, power struggles, and conflicts if we, *as members of the Body of Christ*, hold ourselves accountable to follow Biblical principles.

God is our Guide, our Provider and our Protector and He gives wisdom to all who ask. We rely on Him as we seek to govern ourselves in unity in our leadership decisions.



rom morning until night, I make decision after decision:

Get up and walk this morning or stay in bed?

- ₩ What to wear?
- € Coffee or no?

Which work project to tackle first?

How to answer that hard question from a child?

₩ What should I make for dinner?

Should I bring up an issue or let it rest for a while?

How should I spend the time after dinner—winding down, or getting one thing off the to-do list?

Go to bed early to read, or spend time talking with the daughters that won't be here at bedtime very much longer?

And Some Take Wisdom...

Some of these decisions are inconsequential—the contents of my morning oats have no bearing on how life plays out on a long-term basis. But some of these questions warrant more consideration. They require wisdom.

I've always thought of wisdom as making the best possible choice with the information available to me. But when I looked up "God's attribute of wisdom", I found another way of looking at it.

A Messianic Jewish website (shema. com/gods-attributes-gods-wisom-3031) told me that "wisdom is that attribute of God whereby He produces the best possible results with the best possible means...wisdom results from insight into the things that are studied."

Wisdom's Pull

Wisdom
seems to pull
from many
of God's
attributes.
He knows
everything—
every possible
outcome and every
bit of information

that plays into a decision. He is infinite, *not* limited to a short lifetime of facts and experience. He is omnipotent and works each situation out for His good and His glory. He is sovereign, ruling over all things with complete control. With the power and perspective He has, His wisdom has no limit!

And wisdom is a communicable attribute—we as humans can reflect *(even if imperfectly)* this quality of God. I sometimes think that wisdom

is one of the hardest attributes to develop in my life. It takes diligence and intentionality to gather information; discernment to judge those facts; insight to apply the right course of action. We should also add much prayer and seeking of God's Word to that list, for only by seeking God will we be able to determine the wisest way to show Him in our lives!

How to Grow in Wisdom

And as we intentional seek to obey what we find in His Word, we will grow in wisdom

(Deuteronomy 4:6).

So how
does God's
attribute
of wisdom
influence how
we interact
with Him and
others?

Knowing that God has the ultimate wisdom should firmly ground our trust in Him. Even when things seem to be progressing counter to His will, we can trust that He is working things out according to His purposes. It should also grow our patience with His timing because we know our wise God's timeframe is far better than anything we can come up with.

And, as we interact with those around us, we must steep our life in God's Word and good counsel so that we can reflect Christ as accurately as possible. When we seek God's wisdom regularly, it will live itself out in our lives, seeping out into each decision and interaction.

This isn't to say that we don't need to think about decisions or seek further information—rather, that the more of God's Word we put into our hearts, but more it will impact how we look at situations, how we make decisions, and how we counsel others.

Keep Studying!

There are many more attributes of God to study, but this is the final article I'll write in this series. I encourage you to find a list of God's qualities and take time to study them for yourself. Search out verses that illustrate each quality and memorize a few. Ponder the ways each attribute informs the way you interact with God and with others. Seek to exemplify the communicable attributes and praise God for all of them!

his past month, the 3rd EBC team went to Bolivia to work alongside our missionaries, **Dan and Judy Burke**. The Burkes have been working with a distinct tribal group, the Chimane people in the Amazon basin area.

Dan and Judy's ministry is to teach Biblical truth and to disciple the Chimane's in their own language. They do this by writing materials, printing them and holding classes at the training center which they built.

Part of the year the Burkes live in the high mountain city of Cochabamba



where they work on the books. This is where our team worked.

Many People AND Languages

Bolivia is a nation of 36 indigenous languages and 12 million people.

Missionaries for Ethnos 360, Dan and Judy have learned the Chimane language in addition to Spanish and have labored to produce materials to read in this new written tongue.

We, (Julie Greath, Ken and Ruth Quiring and Chris and Doug Mollerstuen), went to Bolivia to provide print and publishing support for this ministry and to provide family of God support and time spent as friends.

No Other Written Words!

The Chimane people are drawn to the Gospel presented in Dan and Judy's books. These are the only literature written in Chimane. Dan and Judy are alone in this endeavor with almost no contact with people other than Chimane.

Hence our mission to give them contact with family from their home churches.

Busy Time

In our two weeks there, we folded over 60,000 sheets of paper. The talk was great while our fingers folded and creased papers. Covers of each book are covered with wide tape to slow down the destruction of the books from humidity. We would spend 6 or more hours each day folding and creasing paper—





also stapling books together with their industrial stapler which needs to be replaced since it jams every

few books. Daily devotions with Dan were at 10 each day. We went through Colossians, 1st and 2nd Peter, and Philemon.

Stretching Our Legs!

After bookmaking, we often walked to town for a walk in a nearby park.

One of our sightseeing trips was to the "*Cristo*". It is the second largest one in the world at 40+ meters tall.

Judy was amazing—she prepared 3 meals a day for us in her small kitchen. I am not sure how she did it, because she worked right alongside us all days.

Special Trip

A very special trip was a flight to where Dan and Judy live most of the year. This is where their ministry with the Chimane people is. The flight was about 45 minutes. We flew at 17,500 feet to go over the Andes Mountains.

Dan and Judy have built 12 dormitories for the Chimane families to stay in while they are attending classes. Each family gets one 8 x 10 room with up to 10 members in one room. Dan has built a kitchen facility where meals are prepared 3 times a day for 150 people per meal. There are 10 more dormitories being built.


