
[It has been said by others that Millennials are not] leaving the church because we don't find the cool factor there; we're leaving

a twentysomething, I can say with confidence that when it



comes to church, we don't want cool as much as we want real."

... But a deeper problem is that Christianity has become too obsessed with how it is perceived. Just like the Photoshop-savvy Millennials she is so desperate to retain, the church is ever more meticulously concerned with her image, monitoring what people are saying about her and taking cues from that.

Rather, what I need is something bigger than me, older than me, bound by a truth that transcends me and a story that will outlast me...

. . . I'm not saying that the church should never listen to the audience or pay attention to data and trends. It's just that more often than not, the "just tell us what you want us to *be!*" approach does more harm than good, turning the church

into a shape-shifting chameleon with ever-diminishing ecclesiological confidence and cultural legitimacy. It smacks of desperation and weakness.

... As a Millennial, if I'm truly honest with myself, what I really need from the church is not another yes—man entity enabling my hubris and giving me what I want. Rather, what I need is something bigger than me, older than me, bound by a truth that transcends me and a story that will outlast me; basically, something that doesn't change to fit me and my whims, but changes me to be the Christ—like person I was created to be.



Got You Thinking?

Hopefully some of these insights got you thinking.

Are we trying to entertain people to Jesus?

Are we trying to make Christ a little snazzier and culturally appealing?


Are we trying to reinterpret the message to fit each new generation?

His is a message that is unchanging and relevant for every generation of lost sinners.

oday's myth is the declaration some have made that Christianity is opposed to science, or perhaps better stated, as *incompatible* with science.

Outgrowing ... God?

Richard Dawkins has written a book called "<u>Outgrowing God</u>." Dawkins is an outspoken atheist and naturalist who declares that evolution is the answer for where we find morality and the definition of good.

In a TED talk, he promoted "militant atheism." He stated that the mingling of Christianity and science is not possible. He said, *"Evolution is fundamentally hostile to religion ... I believe a true understanding of Darwinism is deeply corrosive to a religious faith."*

That's an interesting statement, and while I agree with him that Darwinism can be deeply corrosive to a Christian faith, I disagree with his stance that science and



Christianity cannot and should not exist together. But we need to remember that Dawkins, as an atheist, is truly struggling with science having a divine component.

Another One...

I've recently also read some of **Jerry Coyne's** recent book called *Faith* <u>vs. Fact</u>. Coyne is another outspoken atheist and evolutionist, and has in fact written another book called <u>Why</u> <u>Evolution is True</u>.

In his new book, he spends essentially all of it describing why Christianity and science are mutually incompatible. He calls them intrinsically opposed to one another.

Do YOU Agree?

Conversely, there are Christians who feel the same, in that we cannot mix science and faith, because they believe science does *not* allow for a divine component. That's *not* true, but there are many accounts where the church and scientists have had unfortunate disagreements; Capernicus and the church, followed by Galileo and the church are examples, but we should also remember that many contributions toward science, throughout history, have been by Christians.

Interestingly, the majority of Nobel Prize winners have been Christian.

Some Grains of Truth, BUT...

You and I appreciate science when we are taking a medication that a scientist ascertained will help us with our ailment, but that's *not* the main drive behind this myth.

Mythbusters #4

The grain of truth that causes the problem in this myth has less to do with science and more to do with how the data is used conclusively in the science. The issues come when a scientist sets out to prove spiritual things based on their spiritual preference and *not* their findings. For instance, Dawkins, Coyne, and Lewontin are brilliant scientists, but they use their status as scientists to promote their beliefs in atheism. When you listen to them, or read their work, you soon discover a strange and bad mixture of philosophy and science.

The issues come when a scientist sets out to prove spiritual things based on their spiritual preference and *not* their findings.

Observations Based on Science

I want to present four observations, and these observations are based on science that is by definition, *"the systematic observation and study of physical structure and behavior of physical elements,*" meaning, science that is veritable and impartial in its ideal qualities.

The Christian faith and the existence of God are not cheapened because of science.

This is a good point to remind ourselves of as we discuss every one of the myths; that because people believe in a myth, does not mean that said belief alters the character of God. God remains the same regardless of our misconceptions.

2 The Christian faith is a rational worldview with the support of reason, knowledge and evidence.

The Christian faith has the support of reason and knowledge and evidence. It is not just opinion or emotion. For instance, in **1 Corinthians 15**, the apostle Paul appeals to the historical evidence for Jesus' bodily resurrection. Jesus provided evidence of His deity by His miracles. Mankind was created with the ability to reason and think.

Science teaches us that God's glory is clearly visible.

English agnostic philosopher and mathematician, **Bertrand Russell** was asked what he would say if after he died he met God. Russell replied, *"God, you gave us insufficient evidence."*

Contrary to that, I believe God *did* give us sufficient evidence. **Psalm 111:2**, *"Great are the works of the LORD, studied by all who*

delight in them." (ESV)

Psalm 19:1a, "the heavens declare the glory of God."


(ESV) Not only does Scripture assert that the heavens declare the glory of God, but Scripture also reminds us that God's glory is

clearly visible. **Romans 1** tells us that ever since the creation of the world, God's works are visible and evident.

Science provides another opportunity for people to trust God or deny God.

Whether under a microscope, through a telescope, or with the naked eye, we see God's handiwork. This leaves us with a vital decision that we are *personally* left to make.

Moes the cosmological evidence point us to God?



Does the teleological evidence (the fact that stuff has design and order) point us to God?

How about the anthropological evidence (man's intellect, emotion and ability to reason)? (cf. Romans 1:18–25)

"Christianity is not rejected because it has been examined and found wanting for objective truth; it is often rejected because it hasn't been examined at all."

Psalm 111:10 reminds us that trusting in God is the most important decision. [⊕]

his summer turned out much different for **Sylvia** and me than we had anticipated or planned. Sylvia's brother was taken to the hospital in May up in Washington with a life-threatening infection.

Little Did We Know...

In summary, he had far more problems than we knew of and Sylvia has had to wrangle with state bureaucrats for days at a time to help her brother get the care and support he needed.

We have made numerous trips to Washington to get Allan, her brother, into the Medicaid system. I am glad to report that her efforts have paid off and Allan has been approved. There were times of stress and tension as we had to make difficult decisions, but the overall experience was marked by God's guidance, intervention, and peace.

Many Problems to Go Around

There are numerous other EBC families that are dealing with difficult situations as tough as ours or even more difficult. Health problems, financial problems, family problems; **PROBLEMS!**

The Question

The question I want to explore is "How do I experience the peace of God while dealing with stressful problems?"

In **Luke 19: 41–44** we read that Jesus stopped as He approached

Jerusalem and cried **"Would** that you had known on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes." (ESV). We have God's Word to find

those "things that make for

peace" with the Holy Spirit opening our eyes to the ways and blessings of God; no longer do we need to be blind to His peace!

Blind AND Numb

People that are blind to God's truth *(unbelievers)* try to find peace through many ways but end up with a false peace that does not stand the

tests of life and time. Some use alcohol or drugs to "numb" their minds and assume that this is the "peace" they are craving. They end up with addictions that create much bigger problems and no peace.

Others look to false religions to find the peace they desire. I had a couple of friends at work that embraced Buddhism to find their "*peace*" through meditation and good works. Although nice people, they did not have the inner peace of God. People embrace materialism to distract themselves and to appear *put together*. The Bible says that "*there is no peace for the wicked*" in Isaiah 48:22 (ESV).

Finding Peace

Christians sometimes also have a difficult time gaining peace in their lives, but this is not God's fault. Paul

tells us in **Romans 14:19** *"let us pursue what makes for peace and mutual understanding"*

(ESV). There is *no* automatic peace. We must do our part by right living and right thinking to gain the peace of God in our souls.

Know Jesus, Know Peace

The source of all true peace comes *from* God. He created peace. His Son is the Prince of Peace. He maintains peace and He will make peace the eternal state for us in His kingdom.

There is *no* true peace apart from our Sovereign Creator God. But know for certain that there are barriers to experiencing God's peace even as Christians. Peter warns us that


"as sojourners and exiles to abstain from the passions which war against your soul" 1 Peter 2:11 (ESV).

Barriers?

What are some barriers to experiencing God's peace?

Wrong desires and/ or ambitions: The Bible says that if we hold to wrong desires or selfish ambitions that we are not following the will of God. (Philippians 2:3; James 1:13-15)

2) Covetousness: The 10th commandment forbids us to hold a strong desire to have other people's things. Paul warns us that covetousness can keep someone from inheriting anything in the kingdom of God. (Exodus 20: 17; Ephesians 5:5).

from God: James 1:20 points out that our anger "does not produce the righteousness of God" (ESV). So many Christians

have problems with their temper and outbursts of anger. It is obvious that the peace of God does not reside in their soul.

4) Critical or contemptuous attitudes or statements:

Jesus warns us in **Matthew 5:22** that those that are critical or contemptuous are putting their souls in danger. There cannot be peace when we are critical or contemptuous of others or even ourselves!

5) Pride is the state of mind that believes self is superior to others and wants glory for himself or herself. How can we expect peace when the Bible says that God loves a humble attitude.

6 Believing false doctrine robs someone

of peace. Correct beliefs about God and His kingdom are foundational for having the peace of God.

IF ...

If I have a false idea about being justified from sin with anything but the death and resurrection of Christ, then I am not able to have assurance of my salvation which is foundational for peace. Paul tells us in **Romans 5:1**, *"Therefore*"

having been justified by faith,

we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (ESV).

Not having a clear grasp of Biblical doctrines that give us a true understanding of who God is and what He has done for our salvation can be a barrier to true peace with God. These are merely a few examples of how we can thwart experiencing the peace of God.

What Steps to Take? What positive steps can we take

to better experience the promise of peace from God? Paul says to make the effort to put aside greed, put aside covetousness, put aside anger, put aside pride and put aside false doctrines.

If we hang on to some of these things it is like having one foot on the dock and the other on a boat that is drifting out. **James 1:6–8** tells us, **"But him ask in faith,** with no doubting, for he who doubts is like a wave of the sea driven and tossed by the wind. For let not that man suppose that he will receive anything from the Lord" (ESV).

Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal any sin we are holding in our lives. To develop correct doctrinal beliefs in the character, attributes and work of God, we have to get to know Him by reading the Bible.

Then most importantly, *we must practice trusting Him* for all things, concerns, worries...*ALL* things. I must know His intentions for me. Jeremiah 29:11 gives us the Lord's intention for His children; "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give

you hope and a future" (NIV). As we read **Proverbs 3:5** (Trust in the Lord with ALL your

heart...) we can better understand what this means knowing what trust is. The more we let go of our past hurts, the more we know who God is and we understand that His intentions for us are for our good, the easier it is to trust Him. Only then can we have wonderful peace that passes all understanding.

Trust's Three Elements

Trust has three elements in it. We must have the capacity to trust others. Some find it difficult to trust due to early childhood problems and trauma. Ask the Lord to help you to trust as the man in Mark 9:24 when he cried out to Jesus "help my unbelief"! Help me to trust You, O Lord, is our cry today (Romans 15:13 NIV).

B To trust someone you must know them. You cannot trust someone you don't know! To have an everlasting peace in the depths of our heart we must KNOW God. You know God from reading the Bible; you know God from experiencing salvation through Jesus Christ; you know God from daily prayers and answers as you walk with Him. Know His attributes from reading "<u>The Attributes of God</u> by **Arthur Pink**.

To trust someone you must know their intentions and motives.

I trust my wife because she has positive motives for my well being. The same for our trust in God! 🕆

When God Seems Far Away ...

Looking Forward

n a bright day in the Black Hills of South Dakota, our young family set off on a hike at Sylvan Lake. As is common for our gang, we knew little about the hike—just that a sister—in—law had recommended it.

On the Trail

In the beginning, the path led us under a canopy of green, a brook splashing next to us. We helped our kids work their way down a chain of huge boulders and often dipped our feet in the cool water flowing next to us. As the trail descended, we chatted with the kids about our trip and the things that were currently important in their lives.

We didn't notice when the path and the creek diverged, or when the shade above our heads grew sparse. And so, when the trail beneath our feet was suddenly dusty and the heat from the sun overhead became intense, our first instinct was to check that we had not accidentally taken a wrong turn. We soon encountered hikers that confirmed we were on the right path, so we hiked on. Surely the path would loop back into the cover of trees and comfort would return.

Conversation dwindled. Someone asked if we were there yet, and we stopped for a water break. After considering a U–turn *(certainly we had already covered more than half the distance!)* we continued.

Are We There, Yet?

The kids began to voice the complaints running through the minds of the adults. *"It's too hot! How much longer? Why do we have to do this? Can't a helicopter come get us?"* Somehow, we had wandered into a wilderness, and we had no idea how much time we would be required to spend there.

"The wilderness" is an apt description for the desolation we can feel when we perceive spiritual distance from God. When it seems like the refreshing, nourishing presence of

the Father is absent, our Christian life feels barren and lonely. We have *head knowledge* that teaches us that God is everywhere, but our finite emotion– based selves feel as if His presence is gone.

What to Do?

So what *should* we do? First, we should check the

path of our heart. The presence of a "wilderness feeling" should motivate us to examine our heart and ask God to reveal any sinful patterns, attitudes, or habits that stand between our heart and the heart of our Father. Anything revealed should be confessed and repented of.

But what if, upon examination, nothing reveals itself? We must then consider that God may have a purpose and a plan for the wilderness we find ourselves in.

We Were Not Alone!

A few minutes spent paging through my Bible reveals many who spent time in the wilderness:

Moses spent 40 years in the wilderness before leading the people of Israel. And then those people spent another 40 years there, learning what God required of His people.

David hid from Saul in the wilderness.

Elijah retreated to the wilderness, as did Jonah.

Even Jesus & Paul spent time in the wilderness prior to beginning ministry.

All for His Glory

It seems clear that God purposefully utilizes wilderness experiences in

the lives of His people, and I would like to suggest that when we find ourselves in our own personal wilderness, we can trust that He intends to use it to prepare us for something to come.

Think about it. As the comfort and distraction of the easy Christian life fade, we gain opportunity to become more dependent on our Provider. We see our own weakness and inabilities more clearly. And as we increase our trust and dependence on God, we become ready for a time of growth or testing.

And here's the cool thing about following a Savior of contradictions: when we intentionally seek Him even as it feels like His presence is far away—we discover His nourishment for our souls.

Look Forward

Instead of focusing on "how soon can I get out of here?" we should instead choose to look forward, to shore up the walls of our faith. We must choose to savor the place where God has led us for this time, to settle in and seek to learn what God has for us, to watch for His work. (In a future article we'll discuss how can do this in a practical way.)

Epilogue

In the end, the trail *did* lead us back to the cover of trees, then the creek, and eventually, the lake. When we finally stepped on to the paved path encircling Sylvan Lake, the beauty

> of the water before us seemed more vivid than it had a few hours before, the water in the fountain where we refilled our canteens even more refreshing.

And I'd like to think that, on *that* hike, our family grew a little. We learned that discomfort won't kill us, that the wilderness even led us to our destination.



here are Christian missionaries all over the world spreading the Gospel message as Christ directed.

These dedicated missionaries need financial support to be able to do their work since most have given up jobs that give a regular paycheck. They instead depend on the Lord to provide their daily support in a less– than–regular salary.

Of course, the Lord does not pour money down from heaven to the missionaries. Instead He pours funds to us through the work that we do and we have the job of giving some of this to the work of the ministry.

Biblical Directive

We have the directive in the Bible to tithe our funds for the work of the Lord, and usually this is given to our local church fellowship for the ministries they do. We then have extra giving over and above this which we have the blessing of giving to others. Many in our congregation individually support various missionaries and organizations apart from their giving to EBC.

Mission Committee Task

The main job of the EBC Missions Committee is to manage the funds in the EBC missions budget. We take this responsibility very seriously as we collectively determine how congregational funds allotted to the missions budget should be spent. We have developed a mixed menu of local and foreign missions to reach various groups of people and projects that we think best reflect the values of our church body.

We Have Limits!

Frequently we have requests for support from individuals or groups, but we cannot give to all of them. Instead, we use various policies EBC has in place to help guide our decisions.

Any organization that we support must adhere to our doctrinal statement and be submitted to the Elders for their review. Prayerfully, we then consider if any request should be denied, be given a one– time gift, or be considered for regular support. Even for regular support, we have guidelines as to the amounts allocated for couples or families. Some requests are best left to individuals who have special interest in certain projects rather than congregational support.

Pray for Guidance

In any case, please pray for our committee: that the Lord guide and direct us, give us wisdom and discernment, and that we are attentive to the needs of the

CEF stands for Child Evangelism Fellowship, a non-profit organization that screens and trains teachers to teach these clubs for kids, geared towards 5–12 year-olds. They also have a summer missions program for teens called *Christian Youth in Action*. The teens attend a week– long training camp in June and go out for the month of July, teaching and leading 5–Day Clubs.

A Whole-Family Ministry!

Volunteering with CEF is a ministry that an entire family can do, whether it be hosting, teaching, attending, or helping to set up for a club.

You can also volunteer to help in the local CEF office with clerical duties or cleaning. During the summer time we also ask for volunteer drivers to help get teens back and forth to clubs.

Real-Life Application

One time I was preparing to teach a Good News Club, practicing my Bible story out loud, when my little 5–year old daughter wanted to listen.

I told her that she'd hear the story later that day at the club and would get tired of hearing it twice, but she assured me she wanted to listen. When I got to the invitation to receive Jesus Christ she had tears in her eyes and wanted to pray right then and there.

It was humbling, knowing that I could've pushed her away unknowingly. When children are ready to receive Jesus we need to be prepared and ready to share the Gospel with them.

The entire ministry of CEF is to prepare our young people and families to share the Gospel in a systematic and careful way, giving opportunities for children to come when ready. They need an invitation, just like we do. Many people do not come to Jesus simply because they are not invited.

History

In the early years Bible lessons took place near the only elementary school in town, Morrison School. The Bible class was held at the First Christian Church, just a couple blocks away. In the early 1950s, Lyle School came on line and a chapel was built on Rainbow Street. As Whitworth School became part of the Dallas School District an effort was made to provide busing of the students to the Lyle Chapel. However much of the class period was consumed by the busing.

In the late 1970s **Ted Westfall** worked with a donor at the First Presbyterian Church to provide a vacant lot adjacent to the new Oakdale School. A chapel was erected, becoming the second building and offsetting busing from the new school. Ted's vision was to have a chapel by each elementary school, so the next one would be at Whitworth. Don and Edythe **Perry** lived directly east of the school and generously provided space on their large lot for this new chapel. This occurred in the early 1980's.

As the program expanded to include middle school young people,

another chapel was built just north of LaCreole School with the generous provision by the First



Methodist Church and building skills of **Steve Cameron**.

Finally, in 2000, another lot became available across from Dallas High School. A major fund-raising effort brought to fruition this great facility. All buildings were funded with no loans! This history overlooks the true wonder of relationships and staff people who have carried the message of God to Dallas young people over several generations.

We praise God!

understanding more than the rest. We could move up to the next level, but I think this repetition is good for me and in a week or so we'll be learning things I don't know yet.




