

Rejected At First

In His first advent, Jesus came to the nation and was rejected by the multitudes. John 1:11 says, "He came to His own, and His own did not receive Him." (NKJV)

He was *not* the Messiah people were looking for. They were looking for a lion, but instead he came as the lamb. As John the Baptist declared, he was "the lamb of God who

takes away the sin of the world." (NKJV)

This, of course, is why we celebrate. For those of us who recognize what Jesus has accomplished, we marvel at the beauty and mystery of God's plan to reconcile sinful humanity to Himself. Those in attendance will first be entertained by a children's choir which will be followed by the youth musical. Expect the entire



hristmas is a special time to reflect on the depth of love God was willing to go for us. Scripture describes the extent of sacrifice God endured for our salvation (cf. John 3:16—He gave His only Son; Philippians 2:-8—Jesus left Heaven taking on the form of man and died on a cross).

Focus: Forgiveness!

In this article the focus is on forgiveness, and more specifically, the myth that Forgiving means forgetting.

This myth has damaged people emotionally, relationally and physically. There are people who want to encourage someone who has been hurt, and they come alongside that person and tell them just to forgive *and forget*.

There are other people who want to manipulate someone, or maybe they just want to avoid facing any kind of accountability or consequence,

so they tell the other person to just forgive and forget (an act I have seen in many abusive situations).

Biblical Mandate?

We quote the statement like it's some kind of biblical mandate, but it's not. People have recklessly quoted **Jeremiah 31:34**, where God says He will remember Israel's sins no more, or **Isaiah 43:25** where God is saying He will not remember your sins. And we often misrepresent these *without* doing a careful study of the context and the idea behind the topic, which tells us something different.

We must answer Scripture with Scripture, so in the context of **Jeremiah 31**, God is recording their sins, stating them and physically recording them to be seen for the past 3,000 years. In a similar way, in the context of **Isaiah 43**, God has listed a long set of sins prior to v. 25. If it's all written out, then forgetting must mean something different than disregarding or overlooking sin.

Infinite!

Psalm 147:5 tells us that God's understanding is infinite. Psalm 139 and 147 and many other places in the Bible remind us that God is all–knowing, omniscient. If God keeps forgetting more and more

sins with each day that passes, He would become less infinite in His understanding. So, "forget" means something different than we are quick to assume, perhaps something more in line with "not holding it against us."

We would do well to focus in more on the word "forgiveness." 1 John 1, verses 8 and 10 remind us of our condition, our need for serious help. We have a terminal disease, and we need a cure. Verse 9 tells us the cure, there is something available to me, something God has made available to all of us, something absolutely vital to our eternal existence—it is forgiveness.

The word in the center of verse 9 is "forgive." I pray we grow to understand and appreciate this word more every day. It is something all of us critically need from God, and it was not free for Him.

The cost of forgiveness.

Hebrews 9:22 reminds us that without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins. The verses prior to that statement talk about the blood of Jesus being the perfect and permanent and better solution than the temporary and constant sacrifice of animals on the

altar. God demanded a payment be made for the wrong, *but God provided the payment.* God, through Christ, absorbed the cost.

Take the time to read **Matthew 18:21–35** and remind yourself of the importance of forgiving others, but also the fact that God forgave us of so very much more.

The value of forgiveness.

We are all sinners in need of forgiveness, and we need to repent and turn to Christ to receive new life. The penalty incurred by sin (eternal death and Hell) is cancelled, but not because God has become lenient, and equally not because that person suddenly became good and deserving.

God's forgiveness is not based on His feeling sorry for the sinner, but on the shed blood of Jesus Christ. It is because Christ paid the full price with all the requirements, that God can forgive us all our sins and wrongs. When we trust Christ as Savior, our sins no longer condemn us because Christ bore the penalty for us. God has absorbed the debt Himself.



The value of forgiveness is obvious as it pertains to our salvation, but King David brings up another side to its value in **Psalm 51**, where he writes about the sins he has committed *even as a believer.* He wrote of how it affected his body, mind, and soul. He said that when he was holding onto unconfessed sin that his body

groaned in pain, but when he experienced forgiveness there was an obvious, tangible change, a physical value.

The call to forgiveness.

We understand the cost and value of forgiveness. And thanks to the promises and faithfulness of God, we know that if we blow it as His children, which we will, our relationship will not be broken but our fellowship with Him will be damaged.

Now think of how this truth affects your relationship with others. God has made it very clear that we are called to forgive. Occasionally, as we apply forgiveness to our personal relationships, we may encounter myths like today's.

I was visiting with a Christian counselor and therapist who mentioned the misconceptions

of forgiveness that he often encounters. I have seen the same through my years of ministry, so I want to provide seven simple points that prayerfully eliminate some of those misconceptions. These are seven good reminders



for all of us as we fellowship and work with one another.

You don't have to see or talk to a person to forgive them. I have even seen incidents where someone needed to forgive someone who had already passed away years ago.

(This one is today's myth)

Your forgiveness can
be sincere even if you
don't forget. Forgetting is not
a prerequisite to forgiveness. This
has a great deal to do with the
topic of trust. I visited a lady who
was sexually abused as a child and
she had been taught that forgiving
the offender meant trusting them
again. That is not the truth, and it
unfortunately led to a long string of
abusive situations.

Your forgiveness

may not change that
person's attitude. In fact,
forgiveness makes some people
angry. So, perhaps consider the first
tip and how you approach it.

Forgiveness is not tolerating, accepting, or excusing people. Forgiveness is not the act of tolerating and accepting what people do.

Avoid Criticism and Promote Unity

here are a plethora of verses calling Christians to walk in unity. **Ephesians 4:3** tells us to "... keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." (NKJV)

The Bible is also full of verses telling us not to have divisions among us.

1 Corinthians 1:10 tells us "... there should be no divisions among you." (NKJV)

Differing Opinions

While we strive for unity among us, it's no secret that we often have different opinions on small matters. *How* we handle these differences in opinions can make a huge impact on whether or not we stay united.

If we talk to people long enough, we are going to eventually disagree on something. It's just going to happen.

How we handle disagreement is important. **Proverbs 15:1** gives us good wisdom on this. "A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger." (NKJV)

Harsh Words...

Criticism is a harsh word. When someone tells us our ideas are bad, we rarely respond by saying something like, "Thank you for

pointing out the errors in my ways. Please allow me to sit



back and listen kindly to what you have to say to correct me."

We get emotional and defend our ideas, often with even more harsh words that stir up increased anger!

What We DON'T Like!

People don't like to be told they are wrong, so let's try to avoid it. **Ephesians 4:29** says "Let no corrupt word proceed out of your mouth, but what is good for necessary edification, that it may impart grace to the hearers." (NKJV)

Offering alternative viewpoints is much more likely to become grace to the hearers than descriptions of why our ideas are insufficient. It would be impractical to suggest that we will agree on everything, but our discussions will be more peaceful without criticism. It's very hard not to get defensive while being criticized.

A Difficult Road

Agreeing on stuff can be hard.
One thing that shouldn't be hard is being kind to one another while trying to agree on stuff. Criticism isn't kind. Ephesians 4:32 tells us, "be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you." (NKJV)

So let's avoid criticizing each other.
And if we are criticized, let's
be tenderhearted and forgive
the one criticizing us. Avoiding
criticism will help us to remain
united.

Forgiveness and reconciliation (restoring a broken relationship) are two different things. The last two tips explain the reconciliation part a bit more.

Forgiveness may never lead to Reconciliation.

Reconciliation cannot happen without true forgiveness.

hristmas is the story of God giving us a gift beyond comprehension. God made flesh, dwelling among us, suffering a gruesome death to spare us from the penalty of our own choices, and being raised to life to defeat death. It is utterly amazing.

We respond to this gift in many different ways, from our initial acceptance of salvation to the daily worship we offer in response to the gift. The wise men recorded in Matthew 2 knew little of what Jesus would endure, but they knew he was the Christ, and they

worshiped him by presenting tangible gifts. This moment eventually inspired the current tradition of giving gifts at Christmas. During this season I am often reminded of the awesome gift God gave us, as well as the appropriate and worshipful response of the magi.

But this is not the limit of our worship-giving. Throughout the year, as you follow the Biblical instruction to give to your church faithfully, you are worshiping God with your gifts. I am inspired by the generosity of God's people. I am moved by the fact that the needs of our churches are consistently met. But you do not stop there. Over and over again, I see you give sacrificially for additional projects, missionaries, separate ministries, and worthwhile causes. You truly demonstrate a love for Christ in your faithful giving.

Our Connect23 project to assist Fisher Bay Bible Camp with upgrades to their chapel had a goal of \$20,000. You gave about \$18,500! While this is a bit short of the goal, it is amazing since we added Ministries Coordinator support as a new need during this same timeframe!

During Connect, the delegates asked us to raise support for the Ministries Coordinator position by April 2024. Our need is \$6,400 per month for salary, benefits, travel, and other expenses. Currently, we have over \$3,400 in monthly pledges, along with almost \$19,000 in one-time gifts. Again, I am inspired and moved by your generosity.



As you contemplate the gift of Christmas this year, I ask that you consider helping us reach our goal. Even a small monthly gift will make a difference for churches across North America.

he classic family exercise around the Thanksgiving table is to name several things they are grateful for. Common answers range from being grateful for family or for things we own.

We're Told to be Thankful!

The Bible teaches us to be thankful; even during negative events.

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 (NKJV).

Not only is gratitude an attitude that the Lord wants us to have but studies show that gratitude has numerous benefits for us in this life on top of being obedient to God. In general, gratitude can be associated with an emotion when something has a positive impact in our lives. But also gratitude can be dispositional where we see beyond ourselves or our situation and are grateful for something greater than ourselves, such as attributes of God even while we travel in a valley.

In the case of having a positive emotion, it is usually linked to accomplishments or getting something material. This is

not an enduring type of gratitude. To develop an attitude of thankfulness through positive or negative times develops resilience.

This type of gratitude is what the Bible is talking about.
There are side effects of gratitude when we develop a habit of being and expressing gratitude to others.

Studies show that being thankful can boost physical health such as lower blood pressure, increase sleep patterns and decrease inflammation. Additionally, reports show several psychological benefits for being grateful, like decreased severity of depression and the ability to "bounce back" after a negative event. Relationships are helped as well; people that are thankful tend to be more generous and compassionate.

Attitude Blockers

There are several attitudes that can block someone from having a capacity for gratitude. These include envy, materialism, self—centeredness, and/or cynicism. (Adapted from several reports). Again and again we are admonished in the Bible to be thankful.

hat does the Bible say about physical security in the church? How are we to respond to physical threats today?

We recognize as followers of Christ we must hold to a Biblical worldview in all areas of life, but what does that look like when we talk about security?

This is the second in a series of articles examining what the Scriptures teach us about security related topics.

n the last month's Sentinel, I presented the argument of the "WHY" of church security.

This month, I would like to introduce the "what and who" aspects of church Security in my series introducing church security as a formal part of the ministry here at Evangelical Bible Church.

And he said to Judah, "Let us build these cities and surround them with walls and towers, gates and bars. The



land is still ours, because we have sought the LORD our God. We have sought him, and he has given us peace on every side." So, they built and prospered. 2 Chronicles 14:7 (ESV)

Security of Today

Today when we think about physical security many things may come to mind. We have locks on the doors and windows to our homes. We have fences and walls to mark boundaries and property lines. Surveillance cameras, access control, alarms, and other technology assist us in protecting both people and property. What does the Bible say about physical security?

Walls and Towers

The scriptures clearly describe cities as having walls and towers. Examples include Rahab hiding the spies (Joshua 2:1-24), Solomon building and fortifying cities (1 Kings 9:15, 1-23; 2 Chronicles 8:3-10), Hezekiah fortifying Jerusalem (2 Kings 20:20: 2 Chronicles 322-8, 30: Isaiah 36:2-22) and Nehemiah completing the wall (Nehemiah **6:15–16).** Walls provided physical protection from other people groups and defined territory. Towers are used to describe fortification, a structure used for the purpose of strengthening defenses.

Gates provided access to the cities and had different functions. whether it was a celebrated entry way serving as a main entrance to the community or a gate used for dung removal or other utility. Gates were places where business was conducted, and disputes were arbitrated. They did provide for the physical security of the city by providing an entry point for normal and invited users through natural surveillance of those entering the gates. Bars which were made of wood or metal were placed across doors and gates to secure them, acting as a lock providing protection for the people inside the door or gate.

Parallels to Today

When we examine the scriptures, we can see physical security was often a need just as it is today. Many of the same solutions we use today are found in the Bible. Those include walls, gates, towers, bars, and other means of fortification. In our present sense, for EBC today, physical security is our building and the methods we use to "fortify" the house of worship, ie: doors, locks, and procedures.

Activity Entrance Upgrade

Many of you have noticed and commented on the new Activity entrance door lock. This includes a "doorbell feature", remote electronic

locks, and associated cameras so that we know who is seeking entry, coming, and leaving the facility.

The combination lock formerly used was highly insecure. I was able to ask youth group members, as well as many randomly selected people if they knew the combination, and amazingly enough... it was not a secret!

Part of the operation of the new lock set will involve the issue of proximity keys (*credit card size*), as well as bluetooth phone "keys". These are capable of being set up for an event, a limited duration, or even a single use key.

Your Patience is Appreciated

Please be patient and understanding as the Security Team and church leadership navigate the sensitive process of securing the building. Your old physical key will no longer work in that lock and you will not be able to share a code with others, your access will be unique to you, and your ministry needs.

Requests for a "key" will be processed through the church office/

Security Team and evaluated for access, duration, and need.

We would like to ask you to actively participate in the security of our house of worship by making sure the doors are shut and not propped open, and that you act as the eyes and ears of the church security team, and if something does not look right, contact an usher by the doors or a church security team member for assistance.

Gatekeepers!

This brings us to the second part of this lengthy article. *The Gatekeepers*.

The scriptures include many individuals and people groups we are familiar with as followers of Christ.

One of the many groups that may not have stood out to you was the *Gatekeepers*. As we discussed in last month's article, part of the physical security

utilized in Biblical times were the walls and gates used to provide security for the occupants and control access to the communities.

One of many scripture passages that describe the Gatekeepers is found in **1 Chronicles 9:23–27**. I used this supporting text in the first article, but there is a part that bears repeating as a reminder and call to action.

23 So they and their sons were in charge of the gates of the house of the Lord, that

is, the house of the tent, as guards. 24 The gatekeepers were on the four sides, east, west, north, and south. 25 And their kinsmen who were in their villages were obligated to come in every seven days, in turn, to be with these, 26 for the four chief gatekeepers, who were Levites, were entrusted to be over the chambers and the treasures of the house of God. 27 And they lodged around the house of God, for on them lay the duty of watching, and they had charge of opening it every morning.

1 Chronicles 9:22-27 (ESV)



What They Did

The Gatekeepers, at this time, were charged with providing security for the Temple. We read here they were Levites entrusted over the chambers and treasures of the house of God (verse 26). Temple gatekeepers were in charge of access to the Temple including those who entered and who exited. They ensured the order and reverence for God's house.

They were tasked with protecting Israelites from themselves, if they chose to try and enter the Temple, when they were unclean (2 Chronicles 23:19). They also protected it from those outside the Israelite tribes. We see then the Gatekeepers were tasked with guarding against both internal and external threats. The Gatekeepers were also responsible for guarding the Temple treasures and the storehouses (1 Chronicles 9:26, 20-22; Nehemiah 12:25).

We see throughout the Old Testament, after the exile, the need for Temple Gatekeepers. They provided protection against both internal and external threats to the Temple and God's people.

Looking Forward

They also provided protection, asset control, and watched over the physical property of the Temple including its treasures and storehouses. These tasks are very similar to what many church security teams do today. As we utilize volunteers to train and supervise and staff this important function, we covet your prayer and support while we adjust the local security landscape of EBC.


and relationships with others here at the church and in our daily lives around our community.

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From idle pondering to ...

Developing Discipline

ur daughter **Natasha** is spending the year in Germany, and that has me thinking. Currently I'm considering Christmas traditions.

This afternoon Nattie's host mom messaged me to ask about favorite cookies. She told me about some of their family traditions—some seemed familiar while others were different. I'll have put up my Christmas tree by the time you read this article, but Natasha won't see one at her host home until right before Christmas.

New Traditions?

Perhaps she will bring home a tradition or two for us to integrate into our customs; maybe her host family will retain something "American" for years to come. Our families' celebrations will be richer for her time in Germany.

Will It Matter?

"Will it matter?" I wonder. Is it just novelty—something less meaningful to me than a dill pickle ornament hidden on a Christmas tree—or is there lasting value?

Idle pondering gives way to focused thought, and realization dawns. These traditions that we carry from year to year and generation to generation, patterns that shape us even as we alter them—they hold weight and value. During Christmas, we practice the discipline of the Christian life in a way more intentional and focused than in the rest of the year.

You see, these carols we sing until we know each word by heart

lead us to meditate on truths of the Christmas message, as does the repeated reading of

the Scripture that narrates it. Advent devotionals lead us into deeper study of these same truths. And the entire season draws

the Christian body together in corporate celebration.

These traditions draw our eye to the greatness of God and His plan and cause us to focus on His story for the world.

You may regard spiritual disciplines as something mysterious and perhaps even a little off–putting. Discipline, after all, brings thoughts of uncomfortable consequences or forced self-control—and who enjoys either of those concepts?

Do We Have It Right?

But what if we've got it all wrong?

In *Celebration of Discipline*, **Richard Foster** describes spiritual disciplines as a door to depth in the Christian walk. These practices—not legalistic laws—can lead us "further up and further in," as Aslan encourages in the Narnian "The Last Battle".

To Be More Christ-Like

Spiritual disciplines are a way to train our hearts and minds to be more like Christ. Some are more

commonly practiced than others. Some will connect better with your heart than others. But each one, when explored, will grow your faith.

What They Teach

The spiritual disciplines teach us to slow down and focus more on being like Jesus than on doing things for people to see and praise. They develop patience and the ability to delay gratification. They help us see Christ and our relationship with Him in new ways. As 2024 opens up before us, I invite you to join me on an exploration of these disciplines. We'll discover what each one means and how we can integrate them into our lives.
