"It's Unfair"

"Dead flies will cause even a bottle of perfume to stink!" (Ecclesiastes 10:1a, NLT).

cclesiastes is a unique book. As you begin reading through it you feel as though you're reading the odd thoughts of a depressed pessimist. Solomon writes this book late in life, and writes of the meaninglessness of everything:



s of everything: Wisdom, pleasure, work, money, and a few other incidentals.

One of his greatest struggles has to do with the unfairness of life (this is a topic I will address from the pulpit June 9).

Frustrations

Solomon says you may achieve great wisdom only to learn things that frustrate you even more. You may attain the things in life that give you pleasure, but none of it lasts. You may work to accomplish great feats or realize terrific amounts of wealth only to see it go to someone who didn't work to get it. *"Meaningless, meaningless, meaningless"* is his verdict.

He spends numerous pages reflecting on the thought that life is unjust, life is not fair. Nearly every human has felt that way at one time or another.

Elders' Epistle By Nat Thomas Chairman, Board of Elders

n addition to the Elder Board, the rest of the pastoral team agreed to share their testimonies. This month, **Pastor Andrew** and **Pastor Mike** agreed to share their conversion experience and lives in general. **THANK YOU**, gentlemen, for sharing your lives with us!

Pastor Andrew:

grew up in a Godly household, for which I am very grateful. It is a huge blessing and privilege in my life that I was raised by God–fearing parents who taught me about Jesus and His salvation. It is because of my parents and our regular attendance to church on Sundays, and other groups like Awana, that I became a believer.



Accepting Christ

I accepted Christ as my Savior when I was 4 or 5 years old, and of that particular day I have little memory. I do know that it was very important to me and that my parents helped me acknowledge my sin before God and ask Jesus to save me from sin and death.

> This decision has changed my life forever, becoming the cause of so much good for me and my family. However, it has

been anything but easy as I learn to orient my life to Christ's and walk in step with His Spirit.

Because I accepted Jesus as the Savior of the world and asked for His forgiveness when I was so young, I do not remember much of my life before Jesus. Obviously, as a child, I was selfish and sinful just like every other child, and I can still be that way today.

A Great and Terrible Fear

What I do remember from growing up was mainly a great and terrible fear after I accepted Jesus. I was terrified that I would lose my salvation if I did things wrong. This fostered a continual awareness in my life of every time I sinned.

Many times I would want to try to hide my sins, even from God, though I knew that it was impossible. I also thought that I was so sinful all the time so I needed to ask for Jesus to save me from my sins every day. I thought that if I didn't repent every day I would lose my salvation, and that I needed to live as perfectly as possible to maintain it. It was a life full of fear.

Gradual Transformation

What ended up changing was not a single moment or event, but rather a gradual growing of understanding of the nature of God's grace for humans.

Over time, as I grew in maturity and knowledge, as I studied God's Word; as I talked with other believers, I came across passages like **Romans 8**, telling me that nothing can separate me from the love of God.

Jesus taught me through His Word that He loved me *unconditionally*, and that because of His salvation and grace, He views me as His son no matter what I have done or will do, because I firmly believe that He is Lord and God, that He came and died for my sins, and that He rose again to bring eternal life for all who believe. Now I can live in confidence and assurance that my salvation

Accepting Jesus!

Many, many years ago, I was sitting in a circle of other seven—year—olds at Blue Lake Park when I prayed a prayer confessing Jesus as Lord.

My faith journey was unchanged until the week I graduated from high school. At that point, I looked back on a bunch of wasted years chasing what was "cool" and popular. At that point I truly wanted something different, so I surrendered my heart to Christ.

Looking Ahead



to do his writing. He had a habit of walking on the beach every



glance at the clock informs me I must leave now—no time to finish up my quiet time. "It's okay; I'll pray on the way," I think. As I pull out of the garage, my watch pings to let me know that I'm 14 minutes away from Dallas and my audiobook automatically starts playing through the van speakers. I'm quickly engrossed in the story until a text notification sounds. I ask Siri to read the text to me and decide the hassle of trying to dictate an answer via talk-to-text isn't necessary...then remember that I was going to pray while I drove. And I'm entering Dallas.

Practicing the spiritual disciplines fulfills us and brings growth—when one actually manages to practice them. But so often life intrudes on the time we set apart for God, chipping away minutes until nothing remains.

The Answer?

So what's the answer? How do we do the things we need to do each day and still somehow manage to cultivate the kind of relational growth with God that we desire? The spiritual discipline of solitude can play a key role here. To consider it simply, solitude makes space to listen for the voice of God, to work through a heart issue, to really see ourselves in His eyes.

A Distracted Life

In today's world we're bombarded by notifications and connections and messages. And we utilize those distractions—even go searching for them to avoid looking into our own hearts and addressing the issues there.

Feeling lonely? Jump on your favorite social media platform to see who has left a message or is available to chat. *Feeling dissatisfied with life?* A run through YouTube or Pinterest will certainly show you how to fix it. *Feeling convicted?* Scroll for a while to forget.

We fill our lives with distractions instead of spending time with

the God who offers the best companionship, gives unending satisfaction, and shows the true condition of our hearts *(and then, through the work of the Holy Spirit, transforms us).*

Making Room

When life fills up and distractions run rampant, we know less of His presence and work in our lives.

We must intentionally make room for conversations with God. The practice of solitude involves drawing away from the distractions of daily life so that we might devote ourselves to the disciplines of study, prayer, meditation, memorization.

"In fact, some contend that solitude is not so much in itself a discipline, but a context for practicing the personal disciplines. In other words, solitude is simply putting yourself in a situation where you can be alone for...Bible reading, prayer, and meditation" (Lifeway: https:// www.lifeway.com/en/articles/ spiritual-disciplines-gospelsolitude-donald-whitney).

Following the Best Example

The gospels show that Jesus valued solitude. We see Him pull away from crowds—not to recharge His social battery, but to spend time with His Father. One can imagine Him sitting on a rock with His face to the sun as He leaned into the presence of God. I'm sure he encountered distractions (a pesky swarm of gnats, disciples worrying about how to feed crowds) during these times, but He knew the value of solitude and placed priority on it.

In the most trying part of His life, Jesus prioritized solitude. He poured out His heart to God in the Garden of Gethsemane and found the strength to walk the path purposed for Him.

Next Steps

➢ Plan for solitude. This may be as simple as going into a room and closing the door to the outside world—leaving your phone and smart watch elsewhere.

Perhaps you turn your phone to airplane mode on the way home from work and use that time to converse with God. You could plan a weekly walk along a secluded path

with only some prayer cards for company. Or it could take shape as a weekend in a quiet motel room or cabin, surrounded by Bible, journal, and a book that God has put on your heart.

Now, write down the plan and tell your family that you have set aside time to be alone with God. This will help lessen interruptions and hold you accountable.

Gather what you need (music to direct your heart toward

worship, your prayer list, verses to meditate on) and take it all with you.

Begin with prayer and leave space to hear God's voice. When your mind wanders, ask Him to draw your thoughts back to Him.

Wait patiently; this discipline won't develop over the course of an hour or even a weekend. It's called a discipline because it will take work to train your heart and mind.

My prayer right now is to not lose faith and trust that God will not leave me when those times come, because sometimes we have to wait in the darkness. I am sure I will

have an *"if you* had been here" moment and wish that God would work on my schedule, but my—and our timing is not what matters.

God has a plan, and—*even in the dark*—He is working.

Why Jesus Stayed

Whenever I have read or heard this story, it always felt odd when it says, **"So when he heard Lazarus** was sick, he stayed two days longer," John 11:6 (NIV) Why does it say "so?"

Why?

Why did Jesus stay away? Well, it could have been to teach them to trust Him, and because he had a bigger plan. Plus, at the time, His life was in danger. However, Jesus could have just said the word and Lazarus would have been healed.

But what would happen if we skipped to the good part every time? A happy ending can only be happy if there was a hard time before it.

Celebrating Women

You may remember from past years that on April 7, Mozambican women are celebrated. Women all over the country do everything they can to afford a new *capulana* (*piece*



of colored cloth which they wear as a skirt) and there is a lot of celebrating as they enjoy "their day."

Special Church Program

We organized a different, but very beautiful, program with the women of the church.

We had Bible games and songs and it brought them a lot of joy. I think one of my

biggest joys, as far as the work is concerned, is seeing this group of women grow, not only in number but also in faith, in wisdom, and in the knowledge of the Word.

Another cause for joy and pride just as great, is the group of teenagers we work with. I don't think I can say exactly in words the deep and sincere friendship that has been formed in this group. I have prayed a lot for this and am so happy for each of them.

> The picture (*above*, *right*) shows only a few of them, but there are around 30 teenagers with whom we gather every Saturday to study and memorize the Word and to enjoy other activities.

We follow a chronological Bible study through which I hope they will reach a deeper and more complete understanding of the Bible as the whole Word of God. Some of them go to the Islamic school in the city and very often they are



challenged to debates on religious topics by colleagues or friends.

June 1: Children's Day

June 1 is "children's day" and we are preparing special program for the children and teens from the church. The picture, *below*, show the teens in



some special programs we organized for them. They really like to prepare and present dramas or Biblical plays which they then present at church. It is a way by which they learn and retain more from the Word.


Thankful!


