**But ...** as you've heard me say before, I do want to encourage you

to exercise your right to vote. We have been given a great privilege to be a part of our own governance.

When Christians refuse to utilize this right, we

yield the direction of our country and its citizens to others—many who have worldviews that are oppositional to our Savior and His work.

#### **Consider This...**

Just a few things to consider:

1) You will not find an ideal candidate. Every candidate at every level

has shortcomings in knowledge and character. On top of this, people have a sin nature and are prone to vices and corruption. While this has discouraged many sincere believers, we should prayerfully vote according to

Scriptural principles and our conscience.

2)"little elections" matter. While the race for the presidency gets most of the

headlines, it is sometimes the smaller races that most affect our personal lives and ministry.

City council and school board elections can have a dramatic effect on our community. Be

prayerful and informed about local elections.

Often it seems like we are either choosing between the "lesser of two evils" or submitting a "throw-away" vote. In such cases, Christians have prayerfully come to different conclusions. Be sure to be gracious to other believers who come to different conclusions as they prayerfully consider what to do with their vote.

When there does not seem to be a good candidate, people have given consideration to other issues:

- ♦ What is the platform and declared intention of a particular candidate?
- ◆ Are policies in play that would oppose the Christian living or that would impede the mission of the church?



Sometimes there is no discernable difference between choices, but we should always ask, "How will this affect my ability to serve Jesus faithfully?"

Prepare to be disappointed, even by your candidate of choice. No matter who is elected, the arm of flesh WILL fail us. But let's make sure that we do not fail our communities by refusing to try to make a difference: to use our vote to try and do what is right.

Be prayerful. Scripture tells us to pray for those in authority.

◆ Pray for our candidates.

 Pray that God might give us who we need and not just who we deserve.

♦ *And* ... when the dust settles, continue praying.

Scripture states,

"I exhort that petitions and prayers, requests and thanksgivings, be made for all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity." 1 Timothy 2:1-2 (LSB)

With imperfect rulers in an imperfect system, remember that our true hope is our Savior.

One day ... He will return and will rule in righteousness and justice. Until then let us live as His witnesses and His people.

**EXCITEMENT about new beginnings is upon us!**The Awana year has begun.

We had meetings and training for leaders in August, as well as an encouraging visit from our local Awana missionary. Now the work of bringing the Word of God to the children and building relationships begins!

#### We're Bursting at the Seams!

The Awana program at EBC Dallas is bursting at the seams! As of Sunday, September 15, our program has registered 144 children for the clubs on Wednesday nights. For the two weeks of meetings so far, we have had over 120 children attend each night.

We are overjoyed at the turnout, and at the same time, a little concerned that we do not have enough workers to effectively meet the challenge.

As directors, we (Matt and Lena) desire that the program be

wo years ago, I was roofing our barn in southern Oregon, and the view from the top was breathtaking. Our property was situated in the foothills overlooking the Rogue River Valley with miles and miles of pear orchards and grape vineyards, and the prominent Table Rock hills to the north and snowcapped Mt. Ashland to the south.

The view from ground level looking up to the top of my roof was nowhere near as impressive (and not just because it represented a lot of work to finish).

As most of you know, my dad passed away a few weeks ago. He was a soldier of Christ on his tour



of duty until his Commander called him home. He lived out the life of faith he professed, and I believe he is enjoying the company of Jesus Christ, his Savior and Lord right now.

He was an active and healthy man who loaded and unloaded United airplanes for 36 years (he was lifting over 60,000 lbs. each day). He was a contractor on the side as well when he retired from the airlines (building and remodeling churches, camps, homes, etc.). He was a daily jogger, even numerous half marathons.

**Drastic Changes** 

I share all of that to emphasize how drastically his life changed when he was diagnosed with Parkinson's at 63. His health went downhill rapidly, he became wheelchair bound not many years later, and was confined to that chair until his passing at 82.

What about his perspective? His view from that chair was nothing like the view from the rooftops. But what about his perspective now? Would not the wonders of eternity, Paradise, and Jesus Christ change everything?

**Aliens In A Foreign Land** 

We are aliens, sojourners, travelers wandering through a foreign land that is *not* our true home, and we must always remember that our

perspective and view from here where we presently live is dim and limited from what we will experience one day.

Colossians 3:1–2, urges us to remember this very thing; "So if you're serious about living this new resurrection life with Christ, act like it. Pursue the things over which Christ presides. Don't shuffle along, eyes to the ground, absorbed with the things right in front of you. Look up, and be alert to what is going on around Christ—that's where the action is. See things from his perspective." (The Message)

'e don't have to read far into the Bible to see God has created life.

The first book of the Bible, Genesis, reveals that on the third day God created plant life (Genesis **1:11).** Plants bearing seeds and fruit enabling them to multiply. How does it read to you?' And he answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself.' And He said to him, 'You have answered correctly; Do this and you will live."

The lawyer trying to justify himself, asked Jesus, "Who is my **neighbor?"** Jesus responded to him with the parable of the Good Samaritan. I will let you look up this passage found in Luke 10:30-37.


#### Your Neighbor?

opportunities for reflection, group discussions, fellowshipping by the pond or ping pong or quiet corners around the lodge, plenty of delicious food, and, of course, games.





round the bend in the path and the view causes me to pause my conversation. Over the Eola Hills, radiant gold threatens to burst through the clouds. And for a moment, it seems as if God's glory itself is almost visible beyond the veil. My heart turns to the Creator and I praise Him for this moment, this vision that draws my heart towards His.

For me, *this is worship*. An everyday happening turns my attention towards the Lord and I respond.

#### What Is Worship?

While Webster defines worship as "the feeling or expression of reverence and adoration for a deity," I prefer to think of it a little differently: worship is the heart's correct response to the awareness of God. It is what happens when we recognize and voice (with words or actions) the majesty and sovereignty of God and His preeminence in all things.

Worship is the heart's correct response to the awareness of God.

#### The Discipline of Worship

It may not feel like it, but worship is a discipline. We can train our mind to turn towards the Father's heart—to attribute praise and honor to Him. And I would argue that growth in the discipline of worship will lead to growth in humility. For as we learn to give God the glory due Him, we in turn seek less praise for our own efforts.

We must be clear that, just as all Kleenex® are tissues but not all tissues are Kleenex®, so also is the relationship between singing worship songs and worship. That 30 minutes of music on Sunday mornings can certainly be a part of worshipping God, but our worship of God must not stop there. We worship God through the way we live our lives, as Paul exhorts in **Colossians 3:17** 

(NIV): "And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him."

We must recognize that the worship service is an opportunity for the body of Christ, the corporate Church, to turn collectively to God and worship together. Songs guide us into praise. Prayer and other Scripture selections do likewise. And the sermon directs and aids us in living a life of worship.

Every part of life can be done in worship—but corporate worship is the entire Body coming together to worship, and then dispersing to continue that worship through our lives. The worship team, through song and Scripture, leads us in becoming aware of His presence with us. We connect with the heart of God through the time of worship, and then we set out into the week better prepared to (as the group Casting Crowns sings) let our lifesong sing to Him.



#### **Methods for Worship**

It is good also to note that people connect their hearts with God's heart in different ways. For me, music and nature quickly bring my focus to God. Others may find their attention and hearts drawn to God through reading or meditation on Scripture, prayer, corporate response,

service, conversation about God—even seeing God at work in the lives of others.

#### We Bring the Sacrifice of Praise

The Bible sometimes likens worship to a sweet–smelling sacrifice; that word picture has been impactful for me in my Christian life. Sometimes I imagine a column of smoke rising above me as I worship. It is unique in color; when I join with others in worship, the columns of each person join together as they rise towards God. On Sunday mornings, it is easy to picture this offering of worship rising from EBC, from the churches in Dallas, from the entire nation.

#### Join With the Angels

In a way, when we worship, we join with the angels worshipping before God's throne. **Sinclair Ferguson** explains this well:

And that's what we're doing when we attend worship together. This is the church we're really going to. We are joining with the angels as they conduct the worship of the Lord Jesus Christ... these angels form a

kind of heavenly choir, now singing in harmony with the redeemed saints who have joined them. And as John Owen once wrote, it's true that all true worship takes place in heaven, so that in our worship, we join our hearts and voices, we "lift up our hearts," as some of the liturgies say—we lift up our minds, our wills, our affections—and we join in the magnificent worship of holy angels, and cherubim, and perfected saints. ("Worship With the Angels," Ligonier. org)

Let's join with the angels in praising our Lord, and then endeavor to bring praise to Him in the way we live out each day!

#### **Next Steps**

Listen to "Hymn of Heaven" by Phil Wickham and try to imagine what it will be like to truly join the angels in Heaven to worship.

Experiment with worshipping in a new way. Take your Bible outside and pray through

# MAKING IT CONNECT.

The adventure and challenges we face as we endeavor to follow God's will for our life.

Hello everyone, thank you for reading our prayer letter. Many of you have partnered with us through your prayers and financial support for almost three years. We have been immensely blessed and encouraged by your partnership through this time as we have served at Moody Aviation and in our community in Spokane.



The past three years have been a time of seeking God's direction about when and how we might pursue serving with mission aviation overseas. Serving at Moody Aviation was a part of this pursuit. As you have read in our letters this past year, the timeline and plan have changed significantly since 2021 when we started moving in this direction. Now, as the current commitment with Moody Aviation is ending, we are at another place of decision. As we have prayed, we have both felt we are supposed to stay in Spokane, but that our time serving at Moody is ending.

After much consideration we have decided when Andy finishes his current commitment with Moody this summer, we will be leaving Proclaim Aviation and pausing our support. Monthly supporters will have their payments automatically stopped after Andy's commitment with Proclaim Aviation ends on August 15th. We still hope to someday be involved with overseas mission aviation, but for now Spokane is our mission field and Andy will be shifting to work in the private sector.



#### THANK YOU.

Without your support these last three years Andy would not have been able to serve in avionics at Moody Aviation, equipping the next generation of aviation missionaries. During that time the avionics team has completed major upgrade projects on three aircraft in the Moody training fleet as well as maintaining the flying aircraft in safe and operational condition. Your support has also enabled Andy to help with worship music in Moody's chapel services and to be involved in student discipleship.


#### We Need Community




