
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Opportunities!

Declining...

Since 2000, the percentage of Americans identifying as a "practicing Christian" has fallen from 45% to 25%. Christian belief, religious values, church attendance, and Biblically based behavior all show significant decreases with each passing generation.

Unfortunately, our faith is not something that can just be passed to our children like a relay baton or an heirloom handed down in a will. In every generation, each person must develop their own faith and learn to walk with God personally. While our experiences and examples can impact the next generation, such transmission is not automatic.

Much to Do

Certainly, there is much that we can do to encourage the development of faith in those that follow us. Being intentional with religious training and modeling Christlike behavior is very important.

At the same time, we need to make sure that people are learning to follow Jesus and not just a moral code or a community system of values.

What People Need to Know

They need to know the Savior. For it is He who changes our naturally sinful hearts and leads us into obedience.

So what can we do as our culture drifts further and further from God and truth? I want to offer three suggestions:

First, we need to pray.

We are called to be faithful, but we remember that it is God who brings about real change (1 Corinthians 3:6-7). We need to ask Him to change hearts. We need to pray that He would bring revival.

Second, we need to make sure people are finding Jesus and not just religion. It has been said before that there is often a three—generation fade from faith. First, there is a generation that knows God and walks with Him in faith. This generation is followed by another which hears about God but which neither lives by faith nor walks with him. Finally, this generation is followed by another which neither walks with God nor knows about Him.

We need to make sure that each new generation starts at stage one: engaged in a personal walk with Jesus.

Third, as we reach out to our community, we need to realize the unfortunate shift that is occurring in our society. No longer is Christian faith and involvement seen as a cultural value.

They need to know the Savior. For it is He who changes our naturally sinful hearts and leads us into obedience.



On top of this, many of our neighbors are in stage three: in addition to not following God they don't know anything about Him either. Because of the lack of knowledge and shift in values, we need to be even more intentional about sharing Jesus.

At the same time, we need to lovingly take the time to study our community and build relationships to share Christ. What worked in the past, in a backslidden nation, may not work amongst people who have no knowledge of the truth whatsoever.

Watch God Do Great Things!

All of this might seem very depressing or disconcerting. We definitely have our work cut out for us. *But do not give in to hopelessness.* This is the chance to watch God do a great work.

Remember, when Christ ascended to Heaven there were only 11 men standing with Him on the Mount of Olives. On Pentecost, there were only 120 people gathered, but when the Holy Spirit came down, a great revival happened.

Within a generation, the Gospel had spread widely across Europe, Africa, and Asia. So pray for God to work, be diligent in our own labors, and be encouraged, knowing that it may be for just such a time that God has called us.

Points to Ponder

"Rethinking Serving"

Recently, I had lunch with the pastor of a large church, and of the 1,000 plus members, he lamented how only a small percentage are willing to volunteer. This is a common challenge found throughout churches, as well as in most non–profit groups today.

Unstuck Church! The Unstuck Church Consulting Group

(theunstuckgroup.com) published research a few months ago showing that about 35% of adults and students in the church serve on a volunteer team monthly, which is down 10% from where it was prepandemic.

Our percentage at EBC is about 30% when counting individuals able to serve, but around 40% when counting by family units who have at least one person volunteering.

While it is evident that COVID changed the way many people regard interaction with others, it is also clear that we have been moving toward a consumerism mentality that is affecting everything.



Church growth expert, **Carey Nieuwhof**, observed that increasing affluence in America is hurting the growth of the church today. I have been interacting with a growing number of churches that believe the answer for vacant spots that volunteers had once filled is that we now fill them with paid positions.

A BIG Part of the Problem

But honestly, I believe a big part of the problem has been what we as leaders have been neglecting to teach more of through the years, and that is *the significance and beauty of* God's unique gifting in each of our lives and how that glorifies Him and edifies others and therefore accomplishes the mission of the church.

YOUR Gifts

Romans 12:6, 1 Corinthians 12:11, and 1 Peter 4:10 all remind us that we have each been given different spiritual gifts by God to use. This would be a good spot to remind us of our EBC Vision Statement:

We desire each person know Jesus, grow in Jesus, and go for Jesus into their community with the good news.

What Can We Change? What can we do differently?

Allow me to provide an example of the mistakes leaders can make from my own life. My personality prefers order and strategic thinking, meaning, I can envision the need for certain roles and positions and what those would achieve and I like to see

things accomplished with excellence. That sounds great in a for-profit organization, but in a church we should understand that serving with purpose is more important than a position, and relationships are to be valued more than accomplishments. Often the desire to enhance our personal image is sadly stronger than our desire to simply serve God with all our heart.

And while we most certainly have many ministries in the church that could use more help, we want to first make it clear that our desire is that everyone sees the value of engaging together in the mission of the church and find fulfillment and joy in serving God and others. We don't want to be guilty of just filling holes, we want to meet needs, and it is a joy to partner in ministry with you for the glory of God. ‡

few years ago, EBC made the decision to discontinue membership with MOPs and to use Mom to Mom as a way to minister to mothers instead. This has been a good change in many ways, and we have seen growth in the group as a result of the switch. One effect of this shift is that the program is open to mothers of all ages (instead of just mothers of preschool children).

New Challenges

Now, 4-5 years down the line, we have a new challenge to meet that comes from the change. Because mothers with children of any age can come, and because more families are choosing to use alternative education options (charter schools, homeschooling, etc), we have more school-age children that need to be cared for during Mom to Mom.

Our care for these school–age children has evolved over the course of time. We quickly found out that a "school room" where the kids would quietly work on homework was not feasible, as the kids enjoyed the opportunity to talk and connect with each other. Now we provide a more structured environment where the kids will spend their time productively while also able to go to a cooperative class or other appointment if necessary.


Practical Projects

The EBC Library is here to serve you!


he library, located 2 doors down from the church office, offers a variety of resources.

Elders' Epistle

EBC Congregational Meeting

Ithough business meetings have had the reputation for being boring or of little value, our recent congregational meeting January 26 was the opposite. There were 81 people who attended. It was encouraging to review the minutes of what happened in 2024, recalling how we have been able to

expand our ministries inside the church and outside the church.

The reports given at the meeting demonstrated how the Lord is working through the many ministries at EBC.

Bruce
McGillivray gave
the budget report since

Randy Flaming, church treasurer, was out of town.

Bruce clearly explained how we need to increase our giving and have a mild tightening of our spending. The budget passed 77 to 4 for 2025 with the various committees and

ministries being encouraged to be conservative on extra spending.

A New Roof

One of the largest expenses for 2025 will be the replacement of the roof over the gym and Sunday School wing. The roof was installed in the early 1980's, and has served us well over its nearly 50–year life span. The new roof, including replacing/repairing some dry rot in the

trusses, will cost close to \$175,000.

If people want to contribute specifically to this project, they can designate their gift to the roof project which will come from the facilities development fund.



Other reports given
were from the Missions
Committee, the Youth
Ministry report, and the Worship
Team report. Each of these reports
demonstrate good stewardship and
anticipated future project ideas.

Pastoral Reports

The pastoral staff each gave a report. **Pastor Troy** explained

to be slightly modified regarding the number of Elders required. This necessitates a change in the constitution to be make things consistent with our administrative rules. A vote will be taken on February 16 after the second service to approve (or disapprove) the changes Pastor Troy, Pastor Mike and the Elders have discussed and were referenced at the meeting. Copies of the proposed changes are available at the Welcome Center.

Background

I would like to explain some issues behind the need to make these changes to our constitution, by laws, and policies.

When I was director of the psychology department at the state hospital, responsible for a staff of 70, it was an ongoing process to recruit and retain staff. This was difficult, even though we had a pool of 50 states to choose from!

Many similar patterns show up here as we need to recruit and retain committee members across many teams, including the Elder team, but there is a limited number of people willing to serve on committees.

Several years ago when **Pastor Bill**, our interim pastor, helped

We have a policy that requires term limits for each Elder, but there are not enough willing, qualified recruits to replace them at the end of their term.





EBC to transition to an Elder based governance from a Church Board system, it seemed as though seven members was the best number to require for the composition of the Elder team. But it has become increasingly difficult to retain this number.

We have a policy that requires term limits for each Elder, but there are not enough willing, qualified recruits to replace them at the end of their term. Some possible candidates have been reluctant to accept a nomination due to various reasons, including the time commitment, not having attended EBC for at least two years, or stage of life issues. For this reason, we would like to reduce the minimum requirement of Elders to be at least three, (a skeleton crew), but hopefully up to seven.

Maintaining Standards

The leadership of EBC is committed to maintaining a standard of biblical unity and service to the body of Christ at EBC. We want to encourage each member to consider serving in some capacity at EBC to fulfill the Biblical directive to "serve one another".

It is a double blessing—to those being served and to those who serve. I also want to personally thank all of you who have been on committees and give thanks to those who recently were voted in to serve on a committee. May each of us find ways to build up our local church body for effective service to each other and to our community.

mericans are good at celebrating. We shoot fireworks in July to celebrate our nation's freedom, and we decorate our houses to match any holiday from St. Patrick's Day to Christmas.

In Christian circles, we celebrate, too. Weddings, Advent, communion—each event is an opportunity for the body of Christ to come together in celebration.

A Discipline?

But have you considered celebration as a discipline?

You may think, as I have, that it is easy (or easier) to understand how the study of God's Word or the practice of submission can be considered disciplines. After all, as we intentionally approach each of these exercises, we can see growth in our application and in our relationship with God.



Can We Improve?

But how do we get better at celebration? And to what end?

It may help to look at the history of the Israelites. Even before their escape from Egypt, God began to direct them in commemorating His work in their path. In **Exodus**12, He instructed His people to celebrate His faithfulness through an annual celebration. Later God added further celebrations for the Israelites to observe, each guiding them to remember and ponder some element of His sovereign provision or leadership.



Why Today?

So why should we as Christians celebrate today?

Celebration can cause us to focus our minds on what God wants us to see. You may have heard the phrase, "You find what you look for."

When we get mired down in the heaviness and minutiae of life, we begin to see only more of the same—depressing news, challenges that wear us down.

But celebration encourages us to notice—*and commemorate*—God's work. Once we've made the decision

to look for His hand, we will find more and more examples of His active involvement in our lives. And celebration of God's work grows our trust that He will continue that work.

How?

And this all brings us back to the "how" of celebration. How can we intentionally—as individuals and as a corporate church body—grow in the practice of this discipline?

Let's start small and start with our hearts. At a recent church service, our worship leader led us in celebration of the fact that Christ lives in and through us. When we take time to recognize that small fact and find joy in God's presence in our lives, we celebrate. When we go home from church humming the

tune to the hymn "Christ Liveth in Me," we celebrate.

Each encounter with God, each experience throughout the day, is an opportunity to choose to look for God's work in and around us, and to celebrate what we find.

Next Steps:

- When you see evidence of God at work, *celebrate!* Text a friend to tell them how you see God working in their life or create a "memorial" to mark that work (Joshua 4). I have a friend who has been on a long health journey; each time she passes a milestone in her recovery, her husband gifts her a new charm for a bracelet and her family celebrates and praises God together.
- Read one of the psalms of celebration written by David—*a* man who often celebrated—and meditate on it. **Psalms 8 and 9** would be a great place to start.
- As you pursue the discipline of study, look for the work God has done over the course of history and then write a prayer praising God for what He has done.
- When you attend a celebratory event such as a worship service, wedding, or communion service, intentionally meditate on the purpose of that event and praise God for His work.

Keynote Speaker

The first speaker we heard, **Patrice Tsague**, was my favorite. He had a lot of good things to say about knowing your gifts and calling and bringing people together. Although, he never tried to sugarcoat the truth and dove into the problem of conflict between people.

He said that our inability to


