e live in a culture that places a high value on our entertainment and hobbies. Sometimes our pastimes can become an idol, becoming too much of a

priority in our lives, keeping us from time in God's Word and from fellowshipping with other believers. Even so, we need to realize that God has given us a variety of gifts, interests, and abilities. We need to have a Biblical view of such things.

A Problem?

When we place a higher value on our gifts than on the One who gave us those gifts, that is a problem. But we

can also use our gifts and abilities in honor of our Savior.

The New Testament teaches us that God has given

spiritual gifts to all believers for service to the Body of Christ. It

isn't hard to see how mercy, faith and service are from God. However, those gifts which seem spiritual are not the only ones that are spiritually useful. All our gifts are, in fact, given to us from our Maker.

James 1:17 states, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and comes down from the Father of lights."

Even abilities that are not explicitly spiritual in nature come from God and can be used for His glory.

In the book of Exodus, the Lord speaks about the building of the tabernacle. He directs Moses's attention to two specific men.

"See, I have called by name Bezalel, the son of Uri, the son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah. And I have filled him with the Spirit of God in wisdom, in understanding, in knowledge, and in all kinds of craftsmanship..."

Exodus 32:2-3

It is an interesting fact that the first time in Scripture that someone was described as "being filled with the Spirt of God" was in a passage talking about physical craftsmanship!

Things to Ponder

When we have an interest or ability, we should think of ways that we can utilize that gift for Kingdom purposes. Some things can bless the Church directly. Other hobbies can be points of common interest to build relationships with non-believers.

Maybe your coworker, neighbor or schoolmate isn't open to talking about Jesus, but they like to spend time with you around a shared interest. This can be a way to show the love of Christ. It is our hope that this can be an opportunity to be a witness and, in time, might lead to future opportunities for the Gospel.

Difficult Bridges

For almost twelve years our family lived and did ministry in Utah. It could be difficult to build bridges and authentic friendships with our LDS neighbors.

While most people were friendly, there wasn't a large desire to engage with the Baptist pastor and his family. In fact, once people found out about my profession, invisible walls seemed to form. It was hard to be fishers of men. We had to search for creative ways to build relationships with people that would not accept an invitation to come to our church.

Shared Interests

One of the ways we did this was through our family's love of sports. We enrolled our young children in nearly every sport the local recreation center offered. Sometimes I helped coach. Other times I was a spectator with the other parents. Regardless, I was not ashamed to use my children as the metaphorical bait for my evangelism efforts. *And*



you know what happened? Over time, we built lasting relationships with people who knew us as fellow parents instead of "that pastor and his family."

Sharing interests gave us opportunities to minister.

I also played more than a decade of city—league softball. While I played in a spring church league, I also managed a team in a fall league that was largely comprised of unbelievers. This helped me meet many young men.

Incidentally, it also greatly improved the level of play for our team. More relationships were built as we met families through the local preschool and from Lori's regular involvement in our local elementary school. Sharing interests gave us opportunities to minister.

What Are YOUR Gifts and Interests?

Maybe God gave you the ability to paint, run or kick. Perhaps your interests involve gardening, gaming or bird watching. Instead of these things distracting you from ministry, ask yourself how these interests could be used for God's purposes. It just might be that the silly hobby you love, used for Jesus, gives you the opportunity to share about Him.

he fall season is almost upon us and that means the Christmas Season is just around the corner. This year, EBC will once again be partnering with Samaritan's Purse to provide Christmas gifts in shoeboxes for children around the globe.

What They Are

Our EBC family takes and fills these boxes with various items for children. The boxes are sent to Samaritan's Purse who processes and forwards them to children in need around the world. In addition to the gift items, a message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ is included with each shoebox.

Operation Christmas Child is a great way to show the love of Christ during the Christmas Season. It is also way to help instill the spirit of giving in your children, grandchildren, and neighbors.

What To Include

As you go about your regular shopping, please consider purchasing some of the following to include in your shoebox(es):

Stuffed Animals: Many OCC leaders have stated that children of all ages are excited to receive a stuffed animal in their shoebox.

Toiletry Items:

Toothbrushes, combs, brushes (hair ribbons, barrettes for the girls). PLEASE ... NO TOOTHPASTE OR DEODORANT.

School Supplies: Pencils, pencil sharpeners, erasers, pens, pencil cases, markers, colored pencils, index cards, solar powered calculators, blunt scissors, small rulers, glue sticks (no liquid glue).





Miscellaneous: Balls, coloring books, crayons, cars, play—doh®, yo—yoes, small frisbees, kaleidoscope, marbles, flip flops, hats, gloves, jump ropes, sunglasses.

You Have Options!

If you prefer to provide funds for shipping the shoeboxes, the cost of collecting, processing and shipping the shoebox gifts to children who most likely will never get another Christmas gift remains \$10 per shoebox.

The \$10 also covers the cost of ministry materials and training for local churches. Each shoebox contains material with information about how to accept Christ.

Cash or checks made out to **Samaritan's Purse** can be placed in the offering box on the Welcome Center with designation for **OCC** or **Samaritan's Purse**.

ave you ever felt like some sections of the Bible are less applicable today?

Some of the sections in the New Testament letters with greetings can seem that way. After all, I can't really greet sister Phoebe anymore, *can I?* However, there is still a lot to gain from these sections.

I like to think of Romans 16 as a greetings chapter. It's the last chapter in the book, and there is a fairly long list of people to greet. At first, it feels like there isn't as much applicable information for us today, especially since the people to greet are no longer alive! 2 Timothy 3:16 (NKJV) tells us, "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine..." Therefore, lessons can be learned from Romans 16, just like all the other chapters in Romans.

Being Kind to All Believers

We are taught to be kind to all believers, whether we know them personally or not. Those that originally received the letter from Paul were told to greet all of the



people listed in Romans 16, who are all servants of the Lord. We are still commanded to greet and interact with other Christians. In Romans 16:10–11 (NKJV),

the church is told to greet "those who are of the household of Aristobulus...and Narcissus."

Today we should still embrace other Christians, both those that we know and those that we are introduced to through different Christian households.

Avoiding divisions and offenses will lead to unity in the church and it is a part of being obedient to the Lord.

Be An Encourager!

A second lesson is to actively encourage all believers, no matter how well we know them personally. We should build up those of other Christian households, even if we do not know them well. For me, many of our missionaries fit this category. They are servants of the Lord, and some of them I do not know very well. I should still encourage them through prayer, greetings when they are in town, and financial support, as much as possible.

Lastly, we are to use discernment as we interact with other believers.

Romans 16:17-19 (NKJV) gives

a warning: "Now I urge you, brethren, note those who cause divisions and offenses, contrary to the doctrine you learned, and avoid them. For those who are such do not serve the Lord..."



This warning comes immediately after the command to greet a whole bunch of different Christians. As we are meeting new people and encouraging other believers, we should be watching for those who cause divisions and offenses, especially people we don't know very well.

All Scripture holds treasures and pearls for us to glean. The tiny details in Romans 16 carry great lessons for unity in the church. We should kindly greet and encourage others, especially those of households of servants of the Lord. In doing so, we should watch out for people whose actions cause divisions and offenses. Avoiding divisions and offenses will lead to unity in the church and it is a part of being obedient to the Lord. These lessons in the final Chapter of Romans are definitely worth our attention. \$\frac{1}{2}\$

The Gift of Conflict

Our Role: Gentleness

love my ceramic—lined skillet. It's big enough to cook—and even double—all my recipes and cleanup is a breeze.

Well, cleanup is easy...but there are some rules. For this pan, I must remember not to use a heat setting higher than medium, to use non–scratch utensils, and not to use abrasive cleaning products. As it turns out, my favorite pan is delicate, and I must give it special care in recognizing its limits and needs. I must treat it gently.

Handling Conflict with Gentleness

And that brings us back around to this conversation about conflict. We are called to handle each life situation—*including conflict*—in a manner worthy of God's calling



(**Ephesians 4:1**). We've been looking at **Ephesians 4:2–3** (**NLT**) to guide our thoughts about this topic:

2 Always be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. 3 Make every effort to keep yourselves united in the Spirit, binding yourselves

together with

peace.

Last month we discussed how to be humble in conflict, and now we're following it with gentleness. What does it mean to be gentle in conflict? (I'm no expert; these thoughts come from the process of working out what God is teaching me in my own life.)

Gentleness means treating the person with whom we experience conflict with care. It is softening the harsh edges so that the problem can be

dealt with in a way that honors God instead of spinning into something even bigger than it is currently.

Believe the Best

First, being gentle involves believing the best of the other person. We do this easily for ourselves. We often justify ourselves by our motives, while judging others by their actions. What if we turned the tables and left room to consider the motives of others?

What if we gave them the

benefit of the doubt...just
as we hope they would
do for us?

1 Corinthians 13:7 (AMPC)

encourages us to put this into practice: **"Love...**

is ever ready to believe the best of every person..."

You might wonder how to apply this idea. For me, it's saying, "Maybe..." For instance, when I feel offended by the actions of someone else, I find myself saying, "Maybe they had a rough interaction with someone right before they ran into me." Or "Maybe they didn't intend for their tone and words to come across in such a hurtful way." As I consider what might lie

behind the actions that hurt me, I'm able to leave behind my unkind assumptions.

Take a Breath

A second way to be gentle in conflict is ... *to take a breath*. Before shooting off the first comment that comes to mind, *take a breath*. If possible, before letting that eyebrow raise or side—eye hit your face, *take a breath*. Before hitting send on the email or posting the comment, *take a breath*.

When we pause for just a moment, we give our brain a moment to engage, so that we can offer a response with more thought than emotion behind it. Taking a breath allows us to respond calmly, gently instead of reacting harshly. And it can give us a moment to quickly seek help from the Father so that we might respond in a way that honors Him.

Take the Better Path

Finally, being gentle is what happens when we choose to respond the way

God would, rather than matching the way we feel we have been treated.

James 1:19 (NLT) instructs us to

"... be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to get angry." That's the verse most of us are familiar with. But the following verse helps us to understand why this is important:

"Human anger does not produce the righteousness God desires."

Often when sharp words or hurtful actions come our way, our tendency is to respond in kind, pulling us down to that level while ramping

up the amount of frustration. It creates a cycle that spirals quickly out of control. But when we take a

breath—a moment to pray and consider what might be


behind the offense—and respond in a God—honoring way, we bring the interaction back up to a better level. And that makes the conflict more likely to be solved.

Keep Thinking:

What makes it difficult for you to be gentle in conflict?

How can you apply one of these practices the next time you find yourself in conflict? •

If you are willing to help with these outreach events, please let the office know. It makes scheduling these events easier.





The first such event will be on Halloween with the Dallas Downtown Association with their trick and treat activity. We will have a trunk for kids to trick or treat at.

Dear Friends.

ome of you are new to our letters, so I will remind you of why we are in Cochabamba and not with the Chimanes at this time. In 2014, I (Judy) almost died with a bad case of Dengue Fever.

Dengue Fever is spread by mosquitoes primarily during the rainy season. Recurrent Dengue is more likely to develop fatal consequences. This is one of the main reasons that we started spending the months of January through March up in the highlands of Cochabamba. Being away from Horeb also gives us a break from the normal duties and a lovely change of climate!

This is part of the plan to lengthen our time of missionary service, to prevent burnout, and also to not foster potential dependencies that could come from a permanent physical presence with the Chimanes.

During this time in Cochabamba we completely focus our efforts on developing new materials that we will teach later in the year when we start up the discipleship courses. Currently Dan is writing a commentary (verse by verse Bible study) for the book of James in Chimane. I (Judy) am continuing to write up new lessons in my series of chronological Bible lessons for the Chimane women.

The Burkes have been back with the Chimane people in the lowlands at Horeb for a few months. Here is one of their latest updates to the EBC fellowship....



Dear friends,

hank you for praying for Class 7B. Class 7B is different from our other discipleship classes. Actually, we don't consider it a discipleship class, but an evangelism/outreach class. Most of the people in Class 7B are not believers at this point. The majority of them come from far out and there is nowhere else for them to learn about God's word. There is no one in their area to teach them, so they have come to us.

Thanks to your support we are able to give them a chance to understand God's word. The men in Class 7B studied from the lives of Jacob and Esau up to the call of Moses. Dan feels like the men were understanding well. A couple of the men in particular stood out in following the teaching and asking good questions.

We have finished the first round of courses for the year! Two more rounds to go. We have a two week break before Class 1 will come back on July 17.

Now we have switched gears and gone into construction mode. We had hired Dan's crew of seven young Chimane men that live across the road from us to do the cement work, pouring the columns for both the men's study room and the women's classroom/dining room expansion.

Speaking of dining... finding meat for courses continues to be a bit difficult these days. (Local beef is being shipped to La Paz, where it can be sold at a higher price.) The Lord provided some special meat for this course. Two men from different classes went hunting and killed a tapir. This is a large animal and we were able to buy enough for one of the meals during the course. Dan was gifted with two ribs.

Thank you all for your prayers and support that have enabled us to complete the first of three rounds of our classes for the year and to make big progress on our two construction projects for the year!"


