

to seek God with their whole hearts. This was a call to real change. Sadly, the nation, as a whole, did not follow his instruction.

What People Don't Like

The problem, both then and now, is that people don't like to be told what to do. Most like to believe that they are "good enough" and tend to take the path of least resistance. They would rather continue in a superficial spirituality than take a hard look at their actions and values.

But Jesus calls us to more. His message, at the start of His public ministry was "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." (Matthew 4:17, NIV).

Broken and Sinful

It is painfully apparent that our society is broken and plagued by sin. Recent events scream this reality to us. **Charlie Kirk's** murder, school shootings, increased societal division, and everyday acts of violence along with increasing approval of behaviors and values that God's Word condemns. *We rightly recognize that we need a revival*. There needs to be more than a token acknowledgment of the Savior. A true change of our hearts and actions is needed.

Drawn to Church

I remember that immediately after the terrorist attacks of 9/11 our churches were full. People were seeking the Lord and prayer services were packed. But I also remember that after a few short weeks, life had returned to normal—at least for most. The religious interest and fervor waned as quickly as it had come.

Seek True Repentence

My prayer is that we would, in this hour, see true repentance and transformation of individual and society in general.

But for this to happen, we need to realize that we need a Savior. Jesus did not come to be the perfect teacher or moral example (though He certainly was both of those things). He came because we needed saving. As sinners we had gone astray. Jesus came to pay our penalty and to restore us to God.

Unfortunately...

Unfortunately, many don't want to



be restored to God. They don't want to turn from sin and accept God's forgiveness. They would prefer to be affirmed where they are, without change of heart, mind or behavior. And without change, there can be no healing in our world.

The truth is that unless there is a turn from sin and self—will to Jesus, there are lasting consequences. Individually, there will be no life and no reconciliation. And in our world, there will be no change, only a continued drift into deeper darkness.

What To Include

Toiletry Items:

Toothbrushes, combs, brushes (hair ribbons, barrettes for the girls). PLEASE ... NO TOOTHPASTE OR DEODORANT.

School Supplies: Pencils, pencil sharpeners, erasers, pens, pencil cases, markers, colored pencils, index cards, solar powered calculators, blunt scissors, small rulers, glue sticks (no liquid glue).





Miscellaneous: Balls, coloring books, crayons, cars, Play–Doh®, yo–yos, small Frisbees®, kaleidoscope, marbles, flip flops, hats, gloves, jump ropes, sunglasses.

You Have Options!



Mission Update!



Weekday School of the Bible

eekday School of the Bible is a release time program for public school students. This ministry gives public school students the opportunity to learn about the Bible, the Gospel, and Jesus during the school day every week.

Our teachers are drawn from the Dallas youth pastors and other qualified teachers. Weekday Bible maintains five chapels, one near each of the main public schools in Dallas. The close ties between the Dallas Ministerial Association and Weekday Bible has enabled a great witness to God's work here in Dallas.

Good Start!

This school year has started well. There are already over 250 students enrolled. This number historically grows during the year as the students invite their friends to join them. Last year ended with over 450 students. The kids are excited to learn!

I personally have had the opportunity to substitute teach and assist in classes and observe them, listening, learning, and asking very interesting questions about God and the Bible. Just this week one student was trying to understand how God is the Father, the Son Jesus, and the Holy Spirit, which led to a good discussion involving all of the kids present.

Many Thanks

I'd like to thank all of our teachers, assistants, and volunteers, and the teams who oversee the program, the Executive Team and the Advisory Council members. During the time that I have been involved over the last two years, I've been very impressed by the amount of work that must go into this program.

Major Opportunities (And Some Challenges, Too!)

This year brings a special challenge and an opportunity! Two of our chapels are on leased lots and one of those **(LaCreole Chapel)** has been given a lease termination notice for June, 2026. We are in the process of purchasing the lot, which comes with an almost 30 year old agreement to pay for the street improvement when the City of Dallas starts the work. This might be as soon as the coming year. Our challenge is raising the funds to purchase the lot and finance the street improvement.

This is also our opportunity to own the chapel and not be subject to the needs of other organizations. We praise God that He owns everything and we pray for wisdom in pursuing this project. The growth of the program is surely His work.

"Be Wary Of The Works Of The Flesh"

hen I think of **Galatians**5, I typically think of the fruit of the Spirit and the children's song we sing with kids.

But there's a lot more in **Galatians** 5 than just the fruit of the Spirit. The opposite of the fruit of the Spirit is the works of the flesh, which are a big part of this chapter.

Works of the Flesh

Galatians 5 lists the works of the flesh:

- **Fornication**
- **X** Lewdness
- **X** Idolatry
- **Sorcery**
- **K** Contentions
- **X** Jealousies
- M Outburst of wrath
- **Selfish** ambitions
- **M** Dissensions
- **Envy**
- **Murders**

- ***** And others

This is an important list to observe as it serves as a very specific warning to Christians. If we find ourselves doing



something or thinking in such a way as described in the works of the flesh, then what we're doing needs to change because it is a sinful act. When we are in step with the Holy Spirit, then instead of the works of the flesh, we display the **fruit of the Spirit:**

- ★ Love
- ₩ Peace
- **Patience**
- **Kindness**
- **M** Goodness
- **Faithfulness**
- ≪ Gentleness

It's very easy to assume that we don't have any issues to correct, especially in contrast to the increasingly sinful world we live in.

It's very easy to assume that we don't have any issues to correct, especially in contrast to the increasingly sinful world we live in. However, careful evaluation of the listed works of the flesh can give us a good reminder that we still have our sinful nature and need to continue to strive to be more like Christ. Envy, jealousy, outbursts or wrath, and selfish ambitions are in the same list as murder, adultery and drunkenness.



God's standard is very different from the world's standard.

For example, murder and jealousy are lumped together in the same verse. God's standard sees murderers and jealous people as both guilty of sin and in need of Christ.

Same Penalty!

Both people who succumb to jealousy and murderers deserve the same penalty for their sins when held to God's righteous standard. By human standards, murderers are judged more harshly and can end up in prison, whereas I think most of us are glad that jealousy won't lead to our being locked up behind bars!

If our actions don't send us to jail, we think of ourselves as better than the worst of criminal offenders. It's human nature to compare ourselves to others, as it often makes us feel better about ourselves, but God sees all the works of the flesh as sin.

Don't Judge!

We must be careful not to judge others when we see or hear about

their sins. We should confront the sins and help restore our brothers and sisters in Christ. One needs to be careful not to judge them or to just think better of ourselves.

others: adultery, fornication, sorcery, murder, and drunkenness are much easier to see in others than hatred, contentions, jealousies, wrath, and selfish ambitions. When someone commits a more public sin, we should remember that we also have a sinful nature and are no less guilty of sin than they are. This can help us keep in step with the Holy Spirit and produce the fruit of the Spirit.

If someone does something that makes me angry, I try to realize that it is only that person's sinful nature that I don't like. I should love the person regardless. We are called by God to love others, especially within the church, and this includes restoring our brothers and sisters in

Christ when they sin. By watching for hidden sin in our lives, not comparing ourselves to others, and focusing on love, we shift away from the works of the flesh. Then the Holy Spirit can work further in our hearts to produce the fruit of the Spirit, God's desire for us. †

here is a divide in our society (both in the US and in Canada), and that divide seems to be deepening. The lines are not clear. There was a day when you felt like the people in your group (family, school, job, church, age, etc.) would agree with your thinking. Today it is impossible to know what the person next to you might be thinking. For instance, there are many churches and individuals who are riding the wave of "progressive" thinking to endorsement of sinful behavior.

The tension only seems to be mounting. We watched in horror the assassination of Christian conservative apologist **Charlie Kirk**. And the thing that shocked many of us is how openly this man was mocked within days of his death. Many seemed to publicly assert that he deserved what he got due to his stated beliefs, but many of his stated beliefs were based on Biblical truths and represented the beliefs of many Christians. I know Charlie Kirk wasn't perfect, and there were undoubtedly things he said that we wouldn't all agree with. But he was unashamedly sharing the Gospel, and his positions were very normal for many evangelical believers.

While no one said the quiet part out loud, it kind of felt like there was a group of people publicly declaring open season on the "extremists" who hold to Biblical values.

So, what does that mean to you and me?

- ♦ It means God's Word is true, and we can believe that persecution will come. 1 Timothy 3:12, John 15:18, 1 John 3:13, and other passages promise that we will face persecution if we are following Christ.
- ♦ It means we should rejoice no matter what. 1 Peter 4:12-14 tells us that we shouldn't be surprised when we are persecuted, but that we should rejoice. It says that if we are insulted, we will be blessed. Further, when we are reminded that the end of days is coming, we should rejoice at God's great plan of redemption and restoration (Revelations 21:1).
- ◆ It means we should love those who hate us (Matthew 5:44).



♦ It means we must proclaim the Gospel boldly (**Ephesians 6:19–20, 1 Thessalonians 2:2, Acts 4:29**).

God will not fail us, and this is a moment that others will know we are Christians by our joy, hope, and love. I am so glad that we can face future trials together, as part of a Fellowship of Bible believing churches that are committed to encouraging and supporting one another.

The efficient of Conflict Our Role Patience By Gwen Griffiths

ast week, a conversation between my youngest daughter and myself ended with the statement, "Wow, Mom. You're so much smarter when I let you finish your sentences!"

We Are Impatient By Nature

It's part of our human nature to assume we know what the person to whom we are speaking intends to say and rush in to finish the thought or refute their idea. In conflict, this makes us impatient, eager to defend our view or prove the other person wrong.

Remember Our Verses For This Series?

Always be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. Make every effort to keep yourselves united in



the Spirit, binding yourselves together with peace.

(Ephesians 4:2-3, NLT)

Have you considered how patience impacts conflict, or what it looks like to be patient in conflict?

How Patience Impacts Conflict

Patience changes the rhythm of conflict. When we move away from a fast–paced argument where each person strives to prove the other wrong, we learn

to truly hear each other. I've been following an Instagram® account called *Jimmy On Relationships*. One thing I've learned from the videos I've watched is the importance of letting the other person express their view and its implications before responding.

When someone comes to us with a view different than ours, but we rush to defend ourselves, we tell them that their view isn't important...and that they aren't important. But when we take time to listen to that view, we show that we value them—and

we may learn that we didn't fully understand what they were trying to say!

When someone comes to us with a hurt we've caused, and we rush to justify or defend, we again show a

> lack of value for them and their concern. But when we take the time to listen to the hurt and take responsibility for our part in it, the relationship can grow.



Even when we are the one that has been hurt, taking the time to patiently listen to the other person can help us understand the situation and move toward forgiveness.

Learning to Be Patient

I often joke that I get paid to be patient—the days I spend teaching piano lessons certainly require it! How can we develop this trait in our lives?

1 • yourself. Remember that even developing patience takes patience. God works in each of us in His perfect timing. So ask God to grow this trait in your life and then watch for opportunities to practice it.

2.3–5); each person you interact with is as worthy of sharing their thoughts and perspectives as you are. Take that gentle breath as you pause to consider their words and viewpoint, and then answer slowly and carefully. As you begin to act patiently, you will become more patient.

Keep Thinking:

Consider God's patience with you. *How can you "pay it forward" when you find yourself in conflict?*




Among the busyness though, we want to highlight some of God's blessings:


