Bringing Out the Tree

One thing, however, that we all equally enjoy is bringing out the Christmas tree. We used to be tree snobs and there was no alternative to getting a live tree.

The last few years we've had an artificial one. I can feel myself being judged by a younger version of myself. We do miss the smell of pine and going out as a family to select a tree (often with negotiation and interfamily lobbying on which evergreen to bring home). At least these newer artificial trees look realistic. Not like pipe cleaners wrapped around metal branches.

Whatever the case, it's a strange tradition that we have. I don't know who first thought Christmas should include bringing a tree into the house and covering it in all manner of lights, tinsel, and trinkets. Nevertheless, the tree is one of our favorite traditions. Setting up the Christmas tree is the pinacle of our decorating.



True Meaning...

Of course, lights and stockings, presents and ornaments have nothing to do with the true meaning of the holiday. Christmas is about a baby born roughly two thousand years ago in a small town. The citizens of Bethlehem had no idea that the young child was, in fact, the Creator of the universe clothed in humanity, willingly submitting Himself into the form of a helpless babe.

Though the people were unaware of the magnitude of the moment, the event wasn't without fanfare. The angelic hosts could not contain themselves and broke forth in powerful praise which frightened some shocked shepherds who heard the marvelous news. The heavens themselves displayed the magnitude of the event in the sky, drawing curious wise men from a far—away land to see this child King.

What It's About

Christmas is about Jesus' birth. But the tree is prominent at this first Christmas as well. I can't think of the manger without thinking of the cross. Jesus was not born to remain a baby. Though he grew up and taught of God's truth and love and performed miracles it was not for this reason that He came. Jesus came to save. The cost of our salvation was His death, nailed to a tree.

You might call it the very *first* Christmas tree. Certainly its shadow hung over our Savior's tiny bed. So different than the evergreen in my living room, this tree was not grown to be a happy decoration, but was rather an instrument of death and brutality. *It was an ugly thing.*

Yet, something strange happened. On that tree Jesus willingly gave his life to pay for our sins. God's wrath was poured out on Christ who took our full punishment. But this was the plan from the beginning: in His death Jesus would pay for our guilt and three days later He rose triumphantly from the grave. Today, in view of Christ's glorious victory over death, the cross has been transformed. It also has become an object of beauty. No longer a twisted and ugly thing, it is rather a symbol of the mercy of God—a reminder of His forgiveness and grace—

> of Christ's willingness to take my punishment so that I would have the opportunity to know Him and His love.

So sometimes, in the quiet moments of the holiday season, I look at our tree and remember Christ's own tree.

In those moments, I am left with my thoughts of the baby Jesus and the cross. Bookends of Christ's human ministry, each powerful reminders of His love.

That's what Christmas is all about. And that is worth celebrating. Whether it is with colorful decorations or in quiet contemplation over God's incredible plan, we rejoice in God's mercy. Christmas is about Jesus Christ. †

Weekday School of the Bible

leekday School of the Bible is a release time program for public school students. This ministry gives public school students the opportunity to learn about the Bible, the Gospel, and Jesus during the school day every week.

Qualified Teachers

Our teachers are drawn from the Dallas youth pastors and other qualified teachers. Weekday Bible maintains five chapels, one near each of the main public schools in Dallas. The close ties between the Dallas Ministerial Association and Weekday Bible have enabled a great witness to God's work here in Dallas.

Current Challenges

Our big challenges this year are purchasing the LaCreole Chapel and increasing the High School Chapel (The Hub) Drop—In Center program. The Drop—In Center is now open Mondays and Wednesdays 3:30 PM to 6:30 PM.

Fundraising

We held a Dessert Fundraiser at EBC on November 1. We had about 100 in attendance, and raised, so far,

over \$49,000. I was surprised by the community response!

God is providing abundantly for the work. Many helpers pitched in to provide cakes, cookies, pies, and other desserts, and to help with organization, setup, and cleanup. A special **THANK YOU** to all involved, and to EBC for making the facility available to Weekday Bible.

Follow-Up Project

There will be a follow—up project to improve SE Academy Street sometime in the next couple of years. We are currently only concentrating on the chapel and lot purchase, in order to assure that the LaCreole Release Time program can continue in the next school year.

Please stay tuned for updates! We are almost halfway to our first goal.

History of Weekdday School

n the early years Bible lessons took place near the only elementary school in town, Morrison School. The Bible class was held at the First Christian Church, just a couple blocks away. In the early 1950s Lyle School came on line and a chapel was built on Rainbow Street. As Whitworth School became part of the School District an effort was made to provide busing of the students to the Lyle Chapel. However much of the class period was consumed by busing.

In the late 1970s Ted
Westfall worked with a donor
at the First Presbyterian
Church to provide a vacant lot
adjacent to the new Oakdale
School. A chapel was erected,
becoming the second building
and offsetting busing from
the new school. Ted's vision

Nominating Committee

This group is currently in the process of finding individuals to fill positions on several church boards, committees, and teams. As they prayerfully determine which folks they should contact, it is hoped that those contacted will be willing to serve. If you are sensing God's direction to serve in one of these capacities, you are encouraged to present yourself to the nominating committee. The elections for members of the various boards,

committees, and teams will take place at the congregational meeting in January 2026.

Money Talk

Though the Finance Committee of the church has the overall responsibility of presenting a church budget, various boards, committees, or teams will define their own portions of the church budget.



Accordingly, the Elders have spent time this month seeking God's guidance in determining their portion of the budget. Personally, I sense an enormous responsibility in this regard since this portion includes the paid staff of the church. As with the elections cited above, the budget will be voted on at the congregational meeting in the first month of next year.

Finding a Replacement

In the Elders' Epistle in last month's *Sentinel*, Chairman Joe delineated the steps in the process of our search for a new Associate Pastor. After **Pastor Mike's** departure in August, a search team was quickly formed. The process will be quite lengthy and we are trusting God that He will provide the right man for the job. With holiday interruptions, it may be a while before further information is known and shared.

was to have a chapel by each elementary school, so the next one would be at Whitworth. **Don and Edythe Perry** lived directly east of the school and generously provided space on the large lot for this new chapel. This occurred in the early 1980's.

As the program expanded to include middle school young people another chapel was built just north of Lacreole School, with the generous provision by the First Methodist Church and building skills of Steve Cameron.

Finally, in 2000, another lot became available across from Dallas High School. A major fund-raising effort brought to fruition this great facility. All buildings were funded with no loans! This history overlooks the true wonder of relationships and staff people who have carried the message of God to Dallas young people over several generations.

We praise God!





Meanwhile, please continue to pray for the search team as they continue to seek God's wisdom and guidance in the process, and that they don't become discouraged as they continue their work.

Special Visitors

During the weekend of November 7 – 9, **Kevin Stone** and **Gary Krehbiel**, representing

the Fellowship of Evangelical Bible Churches (FEBC), were in town. Kevin, the President of the FEBC, shared

in both services on Sunday, November 9. He used the text from 1 Corinthians 12:12–31 as the basis of his message and to quite thoroughly explain how the FEBC functions. Understanding Our Talents and Gifts

On the Saturday of that weekend, the Elders met as Gary spent workshop time describing **Working Genius**. According to Working Genius, "Everyone has natural, God-given talents when it comes to work. As it turns out, there are six different types of talents, or geniuses, and each of them is required for accomplishing any kind of endeavor."

For those of us participating, Gary helped us understand our own personal geniuses or gifts. Then, based on individual assessments we had taken earlier in the week, he described how our individual geniuses "form an interdependent model, a comprehensive process for accomplishing any type of work."

This work, in our case, is of course working together as an Elder Board. This was an excellent workshop for us and I pray that we'll see in the future evidences of having gone through it.

Important Meeting

A Congregational Meeting was held in the afternoon of November 16. Though the meeting was lengthy,

there was much information to be gathered. Some of that information might be designated as trivia—*How many kids are registered for Awana?* (130), or *How*

much over budget was the gym roof? (approximately \$10,000)— BUT all of it was worthy to note as relevant to our efforts in furthering God's kingdom.

The biggest take—away for me was that there are several committees or teams in which there is a need for additional help. The kitchen folks need leadership, in Christian Education there is a need for teachers and leaders, the Health Committee needs members, and Connect Groups need leaders. As written above, you are encouraged and invited to use your God—given talents to minister in these areas.

ovember was quite a month! I spent much of the month on the road, speaking at our churches, conducting **Worship Workshops**, meeting with pastors and other church leaders, mediating difficult issues, and more.

I traveled to meet with folks from our churches in Abbotsford, BC; Dallas, OR; Prince Albert, SK; Rapid View, SK; Waldheim, SK; Langham, SK; Dalmeny, SK; Rhineland, SK; Swift Current, SK; and Indian Head, SK. I also met with the leaders of two churches who are considering whether to join our Fellowship. That's just in-person support. I also spent time on the phone or emailing with several other churches.

These months of heavy travel are always exhausting, but also wonderful and invigorating. It is such a joy to visit firsthand and see how God is working among our churches. I cannot think of anything I would rather do than offer support and encouragement to local churches and their leaders.

Everything we do is designed to strengthen and encourage local churches. And local churches are the tool God uses to disciple and nurture believers. The Church is a gift. Important in ways we cannot fully express. Please pray about whether God would have you support our work.

The Gift of Conflict

Our Role: Make Every Efforts

oday I prayed for two friends who have experienced the pain of having a child cut off contact with them. One experienced this recently, while the other told me it has been over four years since she last heard from her daughter (and granddaughters). The children in both instances have professed faith in Christ.

And yet, they have chosen disunity with the people closest to them—their families. I have watched my friends examine their own hearts for offences that need to be admitted and apologized for, pray for these children, continue to reach out even when their phone number is blocked and letters return unopened.



Direction from the Scriptures

Repeatedly, the last phrase from the passage we've been focusing on comes to mind:

Always be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. Make every effort to keep yourselves united in the Spirit, binding yourselves together

with peace. (Ephesians 4:2-3, NLT)

Do All That You Can

When we follow
Christ, we are
commanded to
make every effort
to work out conflicts
we encounter. Romans

12:18 (NLT) adds, "Do all that you can to live in peace with everyone." That's a tall order!

It calls us to give up "rights" in order to show Christ's love:

- The right to be known as in the right or the "better" person, to be the "winner" in a conflict.
- The right to receive an apology.
- The right to be the injured party, receiving sympathy

from others as we gossip about the conflict.

The right to hold a grudge.

The right to distance ourselves from further hurt, protecting our hearts instead of being vulnerable.

Who Should We Prioritize?

In truth, these "rights" aren't so much rights as behaviors and desires that put us in bondage to the hurt—and to sin.

And yet, we hold on to them, prioritizing

ourselves and our feelings over the other person. We must instead practice Paul's words from Philippians 2:3b (NLT): "Be

humble, thinking of others as better than yourselves."

Putting It All Together

Making every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit calls us to take responsibility for our own part in each conflict (humility), to assume

the best of others (gentleness, patience), to forgive, to show compassion for the situation of the person who hurt us (bearing with one another in love).

We must remember that, as Christians, we are called to a higher standard. If God was willing to forgive all our sins and to reconcile with us regardless of our desire or effort towards that goal, then we have a duty to forgive those who offend us.

Yes, But...

I want to insert a disclaimer here. There are times when a hurt or offense is so egregious or has been repeated so many times that boundaries are necessary. But in most conflicts, our goal should be reconciliation. It should be to show Christ's love to others, regardless if that love is shown to us in return.

Putting It Into Practice

The holiday season brings a multitude of opportunities to begin to practice what we've learned so far about conflict. We'll feel rushed




and easily offended at times; we'll encounter people who have hurt us in the past; difficult topics and strong opinions will be encountered.

Let's keep the words of **Ephesians 4:2–3** in mind as we interact with those around us. Let's seek to show Christ's love instead of insisting on our own "rights". Let's do all that we can to live in peace with those around us.

Keep Thinking:

Is there a relationship in which conflict has caused contact to be broken or damaged? Have you made every effort to reconcile? What further efforts could you make now?

What "rights" would you have to give up in order to make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit? †



Helping A New Church And Fellowship W/ Friends

summer trip I have been language and culture consulting every month. All of the locations so far have been in tribes that have not presented the Gospel yet.

This month I went in to a where there is a young church and a new couple who have joined the church planting team there. Several years ago I spent time in there with the original team members so it was fun to spend time there with tribal folk who are now believers. That is

our goal in everything we do here in Papua New Guinea (PNG) and we are encouraged to see God at work.

Once I finished up with that consultant trip I headed to Wewak to join Judith and Timothy for our annual Sepik conference. During our time there we were able to spend time with our Malaumanda teammates for the first time in awhile. Iohn and Christina are just back from their home assignment and Bob and Noby Kennell were just finishing up a trip into the Bisorio tribe where they worked before joining us in Malaumanda. We had three men who shared about Grace during the conference. There is never a day here where we don't need to live by these principles.

Green Card Issues

Now the rest of the update is going to be more focused on our issues with getting Judith's green card. September 12, 2024, I applied for

an I-130 which is there to prove that Judith is my lawful wife so that I can sponsor her Green Card application.

Initially it looked like it might take 5 months to get this approval but two months after we lodged this we saw that the estimate was then 14 months. We contacted an immigration attorney and he told us that 14 months was just the expected time frame for those applications at the moment so we just settled in to wait. Well, it has been about one year since this delay...and it looks like we are staring at a possible further delay.

More Delays...

Earlier today, I logged in to see what the estimate for this first application is and instead of saying three months, it said 15 months. To say that I was distressed by this change would be accurate. I have seen on one website that the government approved next to no 1-130 applications in September and none in October so this may in part be a reflection of the current US government shutdown. *It is hard to say.*

Pray for another trip into Malaumanda in November where **Judith** might possibly be able to join him. Pray also for us to find someone to watch **Timothy** while we are away.

Pray for **Judith** as she balances helping out in the school, helping **Timothy** with his schooling and her engagement/ encouragement with various ladies on the centre.

Pray for the continued outreach to Minini. They should be starting to teach through Romans in late November.

Pray for **Daniel** as he is at Bible school and very busy with a lot of reading and papers to write. Praise that he is doing very well with his classes. Pray for him to find a job sometime soon.

Praise/Pray for **Stephen** as he now has the funds for the rest of this semester. Praise that he was able to get his private pilot's license. Praise also that he was able to find a reliable car.

Pray for the work of church planting here in PNG. There are a lot of challenges on the support side of things these days.

Continue to Pray for **Judith's** US immigration process. We are not sure how long this process is going to take. Pray for us as we consider trying to re–engage with an immigration attorney.

Still Believing ... AND Praying

We have initiated contact with the same immigration attorney that we talked with last year just to make sure that there are no other factors that we need to be aware of. We don't know where this is going and that does make it hard. We do still believe in a Sovereign and Gracious God. Please keep praying.


